Believed that Campfield Will Not Submit a Bid on the Water Contract.

The only certain bidder on the proposed water works contract is the Richmond City Water Works company whose superintendent announced positively that his company would submit a bid.

Mr. Campfield has announced repeatedly within the last three weeks that he was ready to go to New York to confer with the parties that are said to be backing him. Today Mr. Campfield said that he believed he would bid, but added that he "might have to go to New York."

Women Equal Partners With the Men in All Amusements.

Frenchmen cannot live alone; there must always be an Eve in their paradise. The bachelor party, which is a common feature in English social life, is unthinkable in France. How can men enjoy themselves without women? Woman is their enjoyment.

It is only the cold Englishman who wants to leave his wife at home while he banquets or plays golf. The Frenchman's first essays in the royal and ancient game are always accompanied by a feminine retinue—his wife, his aunt and his mother-in-law. It is only when he makes progress in the game and realizes the niceties of its etiquette that he consents to separate himself for an hour or two from feminine society. Unless he plays advanced golf he will always prefer his wife's society on the links to that of a man.

They put up with each other's defects as with a smoky chimney or any other annoyance.

It is the same "getting used" that robs life of its brightness; that makes us blind to the stars and the clouds and the bright procession of the day and year, because we have seen them so often; that keeps us mostly in a numb half alive state, from which only occasionally we are roused to feel that we are living in a divine universe and are ourselves divine.—George S. GUARDS FOR WILSON

JEROME FOR BECKER

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Witnesses in the Becker murder trial testified today that telephone connections were made with Becker's living apartments at 3 o'clock on the morning of the assassination of Herman Rosenthal. After three minutes conversation Becker left the house. This testimony was offered to corroborate allegations that Lieut. Becker talked over the telephone with Jack Rose and later met him personally by appointment. Former district attorney Jerome will be a witness for Becker in an attempt to impeach the truth of Jack Rose's confession. Becker himself also will take the stand.

PLAN CITY AND FEDERAL INSPECTION

New Ordinance Won't Follow All Rules of Department of Agriculture.

In a conference between Dr. T. Henry Davis, city health officer, and A. M. Gardner, city attorney, held last evening, the text of the meat inspection ordinance to supplant the one now in force was discussed and a rough draft of the measure drawn up.

The city council by adopting the report of the committee which investigated the withdrawal of meat inspection from the Holzappel plant, practically abrogated the present ordinance which is based on the rules and regulations of the department of agriculture governing meat inspection.

The new ordinance will contain provisions that incorporate some of the rules of the department of agriculture, but inasmuch as the Holzappel plant does not meet with the approval of the federal meat inspectors, a number of improvements for this plant suggested by the government of necessity will not be included in the new ordinance. The changes in the ordinance will provide for federal inspection at the Stolle plant and for city inspection at the hands of a competent butcher in the Holzappel plant.

Certain provisions for the transportation of meat in the city will be included. The board of health under the proposed ordinance will have the right to order changes and the packers will be compelled to obey them.

consultation at which Dr. Murphy, Dr. Bevan and Dr. Terrell were present it was officially announced that the colonel could not leave before Monday at the earliest. At the same time it was declared that the patient's condition was progressing favorably and that not the slightest indication of a complication that might retard his recovery had been discovered. The surgeons entered Mr. Roosevelt's room at 5:35 o'clock and remained with him 20 minutes.

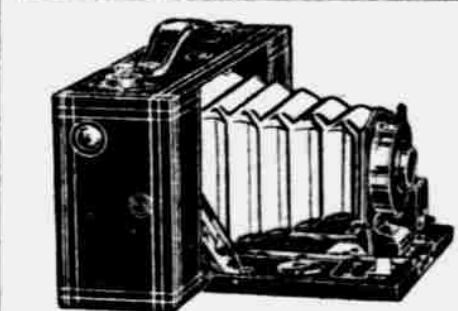
