

What are the Duties of the Superintendent of County Schools?

Should the county superintendent be a judge, a sheriff, a political officeholder, or just an educator who knows his business and gives his whole attention to the schools? He is or has been all of these in different parts of the United States. In Texas it is the county judge who serves in many of the counties as ex-officio superintendent of schools, and in at least one state the sheriff used to hold the office. But Texas expects soon to have real county superintendents in all the counties that are still without them, according to information received at the United States Bureau of Education.

The new Texas plan is based on the urgent needs of the state's rural schools. Texas has three quarters of a million rural-school children. Efficient county supervision is a prime requisite for efficient rural schools. She is endeavoring to relieve her county judges, who make no claim to expert knowledge of rural-school supervision, of their duties as county superintendents of schools, and to select real superintendents whose first claim to the position is professional training and ability.

The Exact Situation in Dayton By President John H. Patterson

President John Patterson, chairman of the Relief Committee, Relief Divisions, Sanitary Officers, Military Officials, Military Officials and representatives of the press, who have been scattered through the entire city, met Sunday. At the end of the meeting President Patterson gave out the following statement:

"The entire situation is now completely in hand, thanks to the prompt action of President Wilson in co-operating with us in sending Secretary of War Garrison, General Leonard Wood, Colonel Rupert Blue and his associates to us.

"The work of cleaning up the city is now proceeding satisfactorily. Immediately upon the arrival of the secretary of war, Governor Cox promptly advised him by telephone to use his own judgment in appointing a chief sanitary officer. Major Thomas L. Rhoades, who was appointed chief sanitary officer, has divided the city into sixteen districts, each in charge of a district sanitary officer, and each sanitary officer has his own staff selected from among local physicians and volunteer physicians from other cities. His instructions in brief form have been sent broadcast over the city, giving definite direction to the inhabitants for the safeguarding of health.

"The sewer and water system is rapidly being re-opened and will probably be in complete working order Monday.

"The telegraph and telephone companies have been rushing operations into the city, but so far, have been utterly unable to answer all the telegrams asking for information.

"This has been particularly hard on relatives of Dayton people, but to relieve the anxiety of as possible, a conservative estimate of the dead indicates that the number will not total over 200.

"We will have 40,000 people to feed for weeks. We will have 20,000 people who will have to be fed and clothed for several weeks, and eventually financed in order that they may be re-established in housekeeping. We are in fairly good shape as far as clothing is concerned, but could use more blankets, underwear, shoes and stoves. Whatever

food should be sent, should be perishable.

"The suffering throughout the city is very much relieved, and with the organization we now have, every one will soon be properly clothed and housed.

"There are enough doctors in the city to take care of all medical work.

"We are also fairly well supplied with nurses, although nurses, competent to act as instructors would be welcome.

"The city has suffered a greater financial loss by the flood than it would have, had a fire swept the same area, as there was practically no insurance carried in the city against floods.

"Perfect order is being maintained and the city will remain under martial law indefinitely. Train service is improving, although it will be some time before there will be any regular train schedule.

"Dayton does not need sight-seers. The militia are impressing sight-seers as well as citizens, in the service, any one who comes as a sight-seer may have to assist in cleaning the streets and aiding in sanitary relief work. John H. Patterson."

HEAVIEST RAINFALL IN EIGHTEEN YEARS

More Than Eleven Inches of Rain Fell Here During Last Week.

During the week of March 23-29, there was 11.15 inches of rainfall, 9.47 inches falling on Monday and Tuesday of last week. The rainfall was the heaviest on Monday, 5.30 inches falling on that day and 4.17 inches falling on Tuesday. According to the weather bureau this is the heaviest rainfall which this locality has experienced. No records which the department have taken in former years, equal this or come within several inches of it. The heaviest rainfall before the last week's record is believed to have been eighteen years ago when about 8 inches of rain fell in one week. No rain fell on Friday or Saturday of last week. The highest temperature was 65 on Monday and the lowest was 22 on Friday. The greatest range of temperature was on Sunday when the highest temperature recorded was 61 and the lowest was 29.
