

PEACE SENTIMENT SOUNDED BY BOARD

Letters Received By Friends Committee Favor Peace Legislation.

TO ELECT SECRETARY

Get Gift of \$2,500 From New York For Negro School Fund.

With today's session the annual meeting of the various boards and committees of the Friends Five Year's meeting which has been in session throughout the week, ends and the visiting church dignitaries will depart for their homes.

This afternoon's session was devoted to the choosing of a general secretary and his assistant. Although fifteen names were under consideration only three names will go up for a vote late this afternoon. The question of enlarging the general headquarters will also be discussed and should anything final be made it will be put to a vote.

Reports on Year's Work.
The chairmen of the boards and committees were present at the morning session and presented brief reports of the year's work. Some of the reports considered by the executive board which did not come before other boards were, the peace report, Sunday school and church extension work.

The peace sentiment in the Friends church has thoroughly been sounded by thousands of copies of letters sent broadcast among Quakers of the world by the Peace committee of which Prof. Allen D. Hole is chairman. The committee reported that very few letters protesting peace and the Friends doctrine have been returned to the committee as the majority of the Quakers are in favor of peace legislation.

Place Paper in Homes.
During the ensuing year an effort will be made to have a copy of "The Peace Messenger" the official organ of the peace committee in every Quaker home. The Sunday schools of the denomination will be the agents of this year's activities. It is expected that a bureau of speakers will be arranged and lectures pertaining to peace will be made by the churchmen.

The committee in charge of the church extension work reports that it has assisted in the establishing of churches in Tennessee, Nebraska and South Carolina. Work of assisting the churches in other parts of the United States was recorded but no additional churches were erected except in the above mentioned fields. The Sunday school committee filed its report which recorded the installation of many additional schools in the west.

Advocate Vocational Training.
A gift of \$2,500 from the New York Yearly meeting to be used in the fund for the negro schools was accepted by the board in charge of negro affairs.
