## MAY WORK CITY PRISONERS DAILY ON THOROUGHFARES

City Attorney Bond will be called upon to determine the legality of a proposition of working inmates of the county jail on the streets of the city next summer. Mayor Robbins said if it is legal for the jail inmates to be used to the advantage of the city they will be put to work. The mayor proposes to have the prisoners assist in collecting garbage ashes and other debris if possible.

Last fall for the first time in many years the prisoners of the jail were put to work on the National road west of the city. The roadway was cleared of debris and put in good condition. At this time Attorney Wilfred Jessup, acting as county attorney, said the act of working the men was a legal one. None of the prisoners objected to the work and preferred to work rather than remain in the jail. More road work will be done by the prisoners next spring, it is planned.
