BOARD WILL SELL ENGINE FOR JUNK

A petition for authority to run a switch across Neff street into the coal yards of the Menke company was presented to the board of public works today. If the board acts favorably on the petition the Pennsylvania railroad company will make the foundation of the tracks in accordance with the demands of the city engineer. It was planned to pave Neff street this year but this action probably will be postponed until next year as the placing of a sewer in Center street is regarded as a more necessary improvement.

The board today passed a resolution to sell the old fire engine, now located at No. 3 hose house, for junk. It was purchased by the city in 1871 when the "paid" fire department was established. It is absolutely useless except for its pump, which the board has offered to sell to the municipal plant if it wants it.

City Controller McMahon announced today he had purchased \$11,312.05 in special street improvement bonds as an investment for the municipal and the light plant sinking funds. The bonds were purchased from Cronin and Meredith, contractors for the improvements at the Reveston addition.
