Mrs. Walsak took the shotgun from him, and he retreated to the woodpile, where he hacked at his head with an ax. When neighbors summoned by telephone arrived, he was pounding shells with an ax, trying to explode them. He drove the rescuers away with the ax and died while hacking himself some more.
