## WHEAT CLOSES LOW FOR SECOND TIME

CHICAGO, March 27.—Wheat closed with a loss of 4¢, and had not the shorts come into the market and covered the list would have suffered more. The September future was largely oversold a week or ten days ago, and shorts are now becoming uneasy because of the one-sided situation. The cash wheat market here was at a stand still, only one car being reported sold. Corn closed at 2¢ to 4¢ lower, and oats were off 2¢ to 1¢, with the July future of the later grain the weakest spot.

Hog products were off sharply. Western receipts of wheat the past week were 4,151,000 bushels, corn 2,632,000 bushels, and oats 5,803,000 bushels.
