## LITTLE THEATRE ACTORS INTEND TO ENTERTAIN DRAMA LOVERS

The Little Theatre company of Chicago, which will give "The Trojan Women" of Euripides at the Gennett theatre Wednesday, April 14, is organized upon a basis quite different from that of other theatres. In the first place it is not a money making enterprise. Mr. Maurice Browne, (whose maiden name was Ellen Van Volkenburg, a name which she still uses upon the stage) is devoting their lives to the resuscitation of the ancient Greek tragedies and other "mythical and classic dramas" (including however some standard modern plays like those of Bernard Shaw) for the purpose of developing a higher ideal in dramatic art with no thought of pecuniary compensation for themselves. Each of the actors from the highest to the lowest receives the same compensation including Mr. and Mrs. Browne, during the performances of the "Trojan Women" and this is barely sufficient to pay their personal expenses during the tour.

Mr. Browne, however, disclaims any mere purpose of reforming theatre goers; he says: "I am free to say I wouldn't go anywhere myself where people aimed to uplift me, and I don't

blame anyone for staying away from the Little theatre if he thinks its prime effort is to uplift. I have the old-fashioned idea that one goes to the theatre to be amused and entertained. If an entertainment doesn't entertain, it doesn't go. I also have the idea that the best works of the masters of dramatic art afford the best entertainment, fire the imagination most and thrill the senses, therefore make one the happiest. This is what we strive to do in the Little theatre.

Overcomes Handicap.

The enterprise suffered in the beginning from two things, both of which have been lived down. One, the idea that this was the place for highbrows only, the other, that the Little theatre was a class affair. Really it is designed as a place where the street sweeper rubs shoulders with the richest and most fashionable. I care no more for the approval of the one than of the other. Nothing has delighted me more than the continued attendance of one business man I have in mind, a clever fellow but not at all intellectual. "Say, you've got me going," was his comment on "The Trojan Women." "You know I thought the thing would get by

me—and here I am 'swallowing every word of it and calling for more.'

The players of the Little theatre are amateur, gifted, enthusiastic men and women, willing to give long hours to the service of the theatre for love of the art of acting.

The plays are performed under the auspices of the Woman's Peace Party and a guarantee fund has been raised by Miss Jane Addams as the representative of that party as a protection against loss. Each of the cities however in which the play is to be acted must agree before hand to provide a certain compensation and it is for this purpose that tickets are being sold in advance at the present time.

All the profits beyond the expenses of the tour are to go to the Peace organization.
