PIVOT PUNCHES WHIP JEFFRIES IN FIRST FIGHT

Cy Young Wallops Previously Unbeaten Local Kid—Jim Oakley Takes Beating From Shaw.

Benson's boxing show at the Eagles' hall last night was the best he has offered this season. Billy's prediction that he had booked men that would give his two boys a hard battle was more than fulfilled.

"Give us more like last night and boxing will be in the ascendency," was a common remark heard today.

The first bout was an exhibition go between two dusky fighters, Arthur Stigall, Independence, Kan., and Battling Brown, Cincinnati. No knockdown was registered, and both finished with hardly an effort. Stigall was willing to make a good exhibition out of it, but so clearly did he outclass the Battler in the scientific side that Brown appeared to be standing still.

Oakley Gets Beating.

Jim Oakley came in for a terrible beating when he started to wade into Kid Shaw of Cincinnati. Jim was over-awful to make a short finish of his opponent, when he had cause to be wary of him. The kid is a long, rangy sort of boxer, who keeps away and lets them come into him, and then uses a wallop upper-cut, which hurts when it lands. Right from the first round Shaw showed his experience over Jim, playing his man cool and in an unworried manner. He showed good sportsmanship when Oakley unquestionably fouled him, by offering his mitt for Oakley's mistake.

Jeffries and Cy Young put up a mighty clever and interesting bout, and up to the eighth round things were pretty even, unless a slight shade might be given to Jeff, because of his forcing it. The eighth witnessed his downfall, however, and he took a hard beating, the hardest he has ever taken. Young is clever—very much so—using an old but effective blow, the pivot shot.

Oakley-Shaw Bout.

Round One—They start off promising, with Oakley the aggressor. Oakley land first blow to the solar plexus. After staging a short toe-to-toe slug-fighting match Oakley rocks Jim with a blow to chin. The kid warms up and worries Shaw with quick cuts to the chin.

Round Two—Shaw hits a blow to chest. They put on a give-and-take, and then Shaw begins his deadly upper cutting again. Round even.

Round Three—This was a good round, with Shaw showing his superiority right from the go. He was still upper cutting. Shaw's round.

Round Four—They mix it and then Oakley lands one on a short rush to the kid's face, and gets one back in the same place. Shaw wheeled into Oakley by forcing him to the ropes. Oakley lands on ear and then brings the first gore with a smack flush on Shaw's nose. Oakley's round.

Round Five—No effective blows were landed in this round, which was devoted mostly to short rushes, ending generally in a clinch. Round even.

Round Six—They got at it hot and heavy, with Oakley considerably slower than in previous rounds. Shaw's upper cutting is beginning to tell. Shaw's round.

Round Seven—This round is all Shaw, who rains blow after blow to Oakley's face. Oakley tries to rush him, and gets hard jolts that put him on dizzy street. Shaw's round.

Round Eight—The gore flows strong from Jim's nose from the smashing upper-cuts. Shaw is giving Jim about the best piece of beating that could be wished, and has him hanging on.

Round Nine—Everything is Shaw in this spasm, and Oakley does well to stay it out.

Round Ten—Oakley manages to stay the round out, although it appears that if Kid would, he could have put him out in short notice.

Shaw gets newspaper decision by a wide margin.
