IN GRAIN MARKET

CHICAGO, April 1.—There was a better feeling in the grain market today and the entire list closed at advances of 1/4¢ for wheat, 1/4¢ for corn, 1/4¢ for oats. Provisions showed but little change, but they were little higher. The seaboard reported 5,000,000 bushels of wheat as taken for export. Minneapolis took 25,000 barrels of flour for export. The business in wheat was small at Chicago, 140,000 bushels corn and 125,000 oats, part of the latter for export. A message from Saskatoon, reporting a falling of wheat to have already commenced.
