

CARD FROM PRISON IN INDIA REACHES REV. A. J. FEEGER

German Relative Interned by
British Sends First Deten-
tion Camp Post Card to Lo-
cal Pastor.

The first post card from a British detention camp of German prisoners reached Richmond today when the Rev. A. J. Feeger, pastor of St. John's Lutheran church, received a card from a relative interned at Ahmednagar, India. The card was mailed February 2, 1915, and was passed by the censor at Bomba.

The following instructions in red ink guide the prisoner in writing the card: "Nothing to be written on this except date and signature of sender. Sentences not required may be erased. If anything is added this card will be destroyed. To avoid delay in delivery all correspondence addressed to prisoners should be written in English and on post cards."

Worked in Africa.
The Rev. Mr. Feeger's relative, Geo. Weichbrodt, an electrical engineer, working for a London firm in South Africa at the outbreak of the war, was sent from there to India.

The sentences which are printed on the card and which convey all the messages a prisoner may write, follow: "I am quite well. I have been admitted to the hospital (and am going on well; and hope to be discharged soon). I have received your card, letter, parcel. Letter follows at first opportunity. I have had no letter from you for a long time."

Prisoners strike out the sentences which do not pertain to them. The card which the Rev. Mr. Feeger received said: "I am quite well. Letter follows at first opportunity." The other sentences were deleted by Mr. Weichbrodt.

M. E. APPOINTMENT REMAINS UNCERTAIN

Conference May Assign New
Pastor to Third Church
Pulpit.

AUBURN, Ind., April 9.—Reports given here at the seventy-second North Indiana Methodist conference show that the Richmond district made a gain of 1,400 in membership during the last year, contrasted with gains of 3,500 and 2,500 respectively in the Fort Wayne and Wabash districts.

Pastors of Richmond churches did not enter the contest for the 1916 session of the conference when Huntington, Fort Wayne, Logansport and Muncie extended invitations to the ministerial body.

Three hundred and sixty pastors have registered. What appointment will be made to fill the vacancy at the Richmond, Third Methodist church, whose pulpit will be unoccupied because of the resignation of the Rev. Sylvester Bilheimer, can not be learned. As the Rev. Mr. Bilheimer has been in failing health for some time, it is probable that he will be allowed to retire, at least, temporarily. There is little doubt that Rev. U. S. A. Bridge and Rev. Harry C. Harman will be returned to their charges in Richmond.

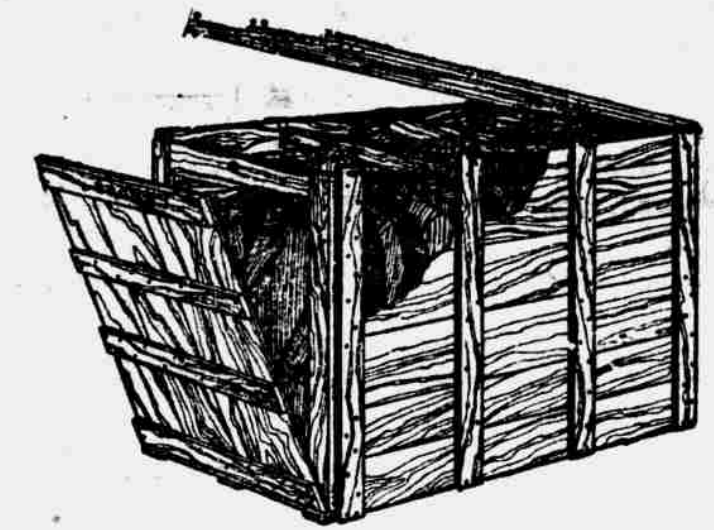
