

MAYOR SENDS FIRST PRISONER TO PENAL FARM ON SENTENCE

Having, as usual, made a sorry muddle of his efforts to effect the reformation of Tim Kelly, a victim of the booze habit, by penning him up in a foul smelling jail every time his appetite for liquor gets the best of him, the county of Wayne has now turned him over to the state of Indiana to see what it can do for him.

Tim, for the seventeenth time in four years pleaded guilty when arraigned in city court this morning and was sentenced to the Indiana Penal Farm, in Putnam county, to serve out a fine of \$50 and costs and an additional sentence of thirty days, ninety days all told. He is the first man to be sentenced to the penal farm from Wayne county, a doubtful distinction, and one of the first men in the state to be sentenced to that institution, which was opened the reception of petty offenders yesterday.

Inasmuch as the establishment of the state penal farm resulted from the vigorous efforts of a number of Richmond men it is fitting that one of the first inmates of the farm should be a Richmond man. And the state's experiment with the case of Tim Kelly will be followed with interest in Richmond.

here, Dr. Cofer and Dr. Hurty will lend whatever personal assistance is needed to make the campaign a success, worthy of national commendation and approval.

The expense which would accrue to Richmond in taking advantage of this plan would be hotel expenses and incidentals during the visit of the government assistant. Dr. Cofer believes that the re-survey could be taken in between sixty and ninety days, and the cost would be approximately \$75 a month. The salary of the assistant would continue to be met by the government.

Hurty suggests Deputy.

Hurty also suggested that the Richmond city council pass an ordinance creating the office of a deputy or assistant to the city health officer, since the laws of Indiana provided for this official. What is needed in Richmond, he said, a health officer, thoroughly familiar with the subject of tuberculosis, who could devote his

entire time to a systematic program for the prevention of the disease's spread. The regularly appointed health officers in the cities of Indiana are unable persistently and constantly to wage a campaign against contagious diseases because their salaries as officials are not sufficiently remunerative to meet their entire living expenses.

Dr. Cofer concurred in the views expressed by Dr. Hurty and both commended the interest which has been shown in the movement inaugurated for the construction of a county hospital to care for tubercular victims. Each, however, intimated that the establishment of a hospital was not necessary if thorough attention was given the educational feature of the campaign against tuberculosis.

Dr. Hurty asserted that the state hospital was not achieving what was expected of it and was not conducted properly.

It was most necessary, he said to eradicate the cases of direct infection by cleaning up the worst conditions gradually working to the outer rim of less infectious cases and more sanitary conditions.

Indescribable good could be done, both officials pointed out, by training the school children to have a wholesome dread of tuberculosis, and other contagious diseases and to know the value of clean living under sanitary conditions.

In the afternoon Dr. Cofer and Dr. Hurty met with the city officials in the council room of the city building and in the evening made impromptu speeches, repeating to the persons at the reception proposal for a city survey.

"It is important that the government should see fit to send me to Richmond to inquire into the conditions existing here relative to tuberculosis and other contagious diseases," Dr. Cofer said. "The proposal of sending a government expert to your city to take a re-survey and assist you in your campaign is a new idea, formulated with the belief that, if it is adopted and carried out, it will mean not only the eradication of tuberculosis in Richmond, but in other cities which seek the assistance of the government public health service in reducing the spread of the disease."

"The government maintains its health service under the treasury department. The military health service is in charge of Dr. Gorgas, and the civic health service is in charge of Surgeon General Blue."

visit to Richmond, the civic health service department can aid you in your efforts to destroy the disease which is prevalent here. After your campaign we can point to your city as an example. Richmond had a death rate of 1.45 per 1,000 people, previous to 1913, and during that year it was decreased. You have evidently been making progress in your efforts to lower the death rate from tuberculosis. By continuing the campaign, it will mean the gradual elimination of this disease.

"The money required to meet the expenses of a campaign and provide for hospitals and surveys, must result from one of two sources, the taxation of the citizens of your city or from popular contributions."

"The question of a dispensary in charge of competent nurses has been tried in a number of cases and each has proved it worth to the community in which it is situated. The educational feature of fighting tuberculosis can not be started too soon. It is surprising how many intelligent persons are woefully ignorant on the subject of tuberculosis."

"Certain offers of help will be made to you as a result of my visit from the health service department. I intend to keep in touch with your city, and will do all in my power and lend whatever personal assistance is necessary to make your campaign, if you accept the services of our experts, result successfully. The department will watch your efforts with keen interest and you will have its support in every way possible."

At the conclusion of Dr. Cofer's speech several persons in the audience, including William Dudley Foulke asked him questions regarding his plan. Mr. Foulke finally ejaculated, "Wouldn't it be a glorious thing to have Richmond pointed out as an object lesson as the first city in Indiana and the United States of America to eliminate entirely tuberculosis?"

Dr. Hurty, in beginning his speech last evening, congratulated the city on its low morbidity and low mortality death rate. The city, he said, was to be commended on the fact that deaths from disease had become gradually less each year.

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
