

OFFER CEDAR SPRINGS HOTEL AS HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Although the proposition will not be considered further by officials of Preble and Montgomery counties talk of the purchase of Cedar Springs for the location of a bi-county tuberculosis hospital has brought out comment in Preble strongly against such action. The chief objection rests on the reported sale price, \$60,000, when the 28.71 acres of land are listed for taxation on the duplicate for only \$12,780. The personal property at the resort is valued at \$4,000.

Cedar Springs lies in a valley a short distance south of New Paris and has long been known as a health resort. The properties of its health-giving Navajoe water have given it a reputation. But when considered as a site for hospital purposes, it is claimed the place is not adapted.

J. E. Parker of this city, is Preble county's trustee on the hospital board. The resort is owned by a stock company and the largest interests are held by Daytonians. The Richmond Auto club has quarters at the resort.

RUMELY BUSINESS REGARDED SMALL

While official figures are not available, the impression prevailed in certain quarters yesterday that a statement by the receiver of the Rumely company will reveal an excess of book assets over the \$10,000,000 debt. The figures in circulation last week showed inventory, plant account, farmers' notes, and bills receivable of substantially \$21,000,000. The volume of business is variously stated to be between \$3,500,000 and \$5,000,000.

C. S. Funk, former president of the company, writes to say of a sentence which recently was printed, as follows:

"It develops that men drawing salaries of \$5,000 a year are doing efficiently the work of men previously receiving \$25,000," that "there are no such instances, and I can not understand why any one should be inter-

ested in the publication of a misleading statement of this character. The facts are that the receiver is continuing as a liquidation a small volume of business and is obviously not in the same condition that the management of a going business of three times the size would be. He is conducting the business with a reduced operating staff, all of whom were members of my staff, but the greater proportion of any savings made took effect automatically with the appointment of a receiver."

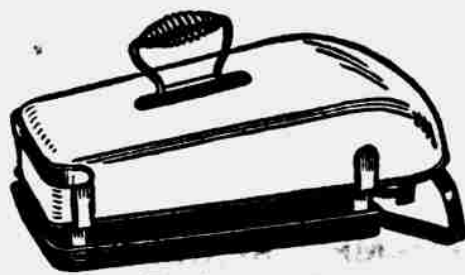
