

RAIN CAUSES HALT TO K OF P EXERCISES

EATON, O., June 14.—When heavy, dark clouds threatened a downpour of rain Sunday afternoon, the memorial service of Waverly lodge, Knights of Pythias, to have been held in Mount Hill cemetery, was transferred to the Pythian temple. After the service a committee proceeded to the cemetery and decorated the graves of deceased brethren, numbering fifty-nine. Judge Edward Belts of Newport, Ky., delivered the memorial address. The speaker was introduced by George W. Spacht, master of ceremonies. Members of the marching line had proceeded a few blocks from Pythian temple on the way to the cemetery when a storm threatened to break at any moment, and the procession turned back and went to the lodge room, where the exercises were conducted. Many persons who had gone to the cemetery in advance of the procession were caught in the downpour. People from nearby cities, towns and the rural districts had gathered here in the largest crowd that had ever been present to witness the memorial and decoration service.

HAND OF LAW DRAGS FROM RICHMOND RICHMOND BOY'S YOUNG SWEETHEART

Myra and Mary Lear, twins, who will be seventeen years old in August, have been returned to their home in Greenville, O., by an officer from that city. They were taken into custody on warrants charging delinquency.

"The Greenville officer told me both girls bore good reputations in that town, and during the time they were in Richmond they conducted themselves properly," Chief Goodwin said. "What disposition the Greenville authorities will make with the girls I do not know. I was informed that their home life was far from ideal, and that they were induced to leave home because of the treatment they had received from their parents. Their mother is suing for divorce, I understand, and she wants the twins as witnesses against their father."

The girls cried bitterly because they were to be returned to Greenville. Myra had been in Richmond about two

months, and was joined by her sister two weeks ago. Both girls said their father had abused them and that their mother had never taken their part. Myra was employed by a Main street firm until last Tuesday. She told the police that the proprietor of the place was exhibiting a vulgar sketch to some employes and patrons, including women, and that he finally approached her and placed the card before her. She told him she did not think very much of people who carried about such things, whereupon he remarked that she probably was too good to work for him, a fact which she assured him was true. She then demanded and received her week's pay. The following day she accepted employment as a domestic in a Fairview home. Her sister, Mary, had been unable to obtain employment, and Myra had been supporting her.
