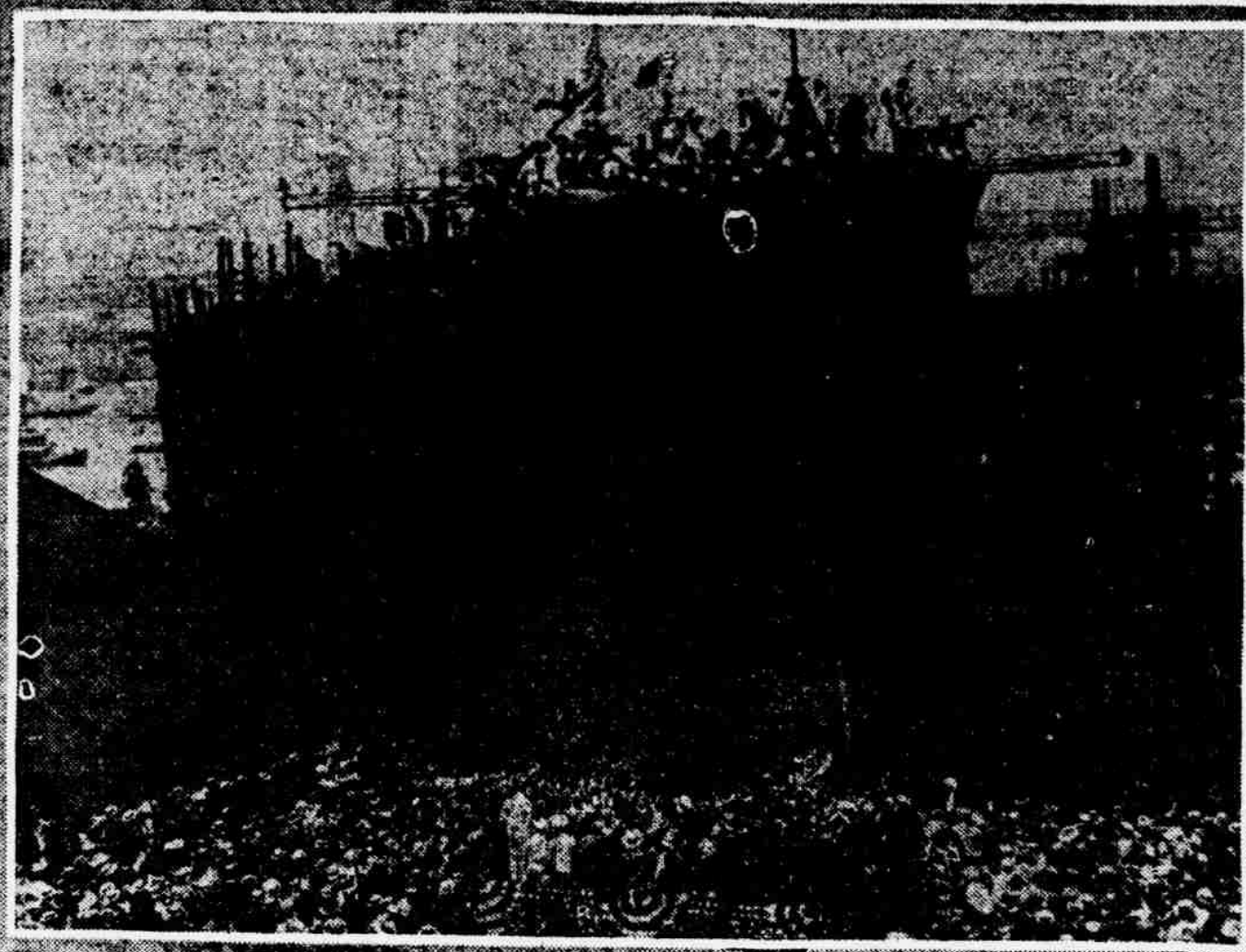

Below is the Arizona sliding down the ways and into the East River.

Amid the cheers of 75,000 people the giant hulk of the Arizona, the latest battleship in Uncle Sam's navy slid down the ways and out into the waters of the East River. The Arizona, when put into commission will be the largest and most powerful fighting craft in the world. She will even surpass the Queen Elizabeth, the fighting giant of the British Navy. She will mount a battery of 12 fourteen-inch guns, besides smaller rifles and torpedo tubes.
