CENTERVILLE, Ind., June 22.—The ladies of the Cemetery association will hold the annual ice cream festival Saturday evening at the town hall.


A cordial invitation is extended to the public to be present and enjoy a social evening. All funds raised will be used in beautifying the cemetery.

Applying Smelling Test to Sample Tea



Uncle Sam says that most of the 100,000 pounds of tea imported into this country annually is spoiled in the brewing. George F. Mitchell, government tea expert, gives the following recipe for making tea: "Into an earthen pot, which has previously been scalded, put an even teaspoonful of tea for every cup desired, and an extra teaspoonful for the pot. Pour over it water which has been boiling for at least a minute. Let it stand for exactly three minutes, then decant it into another pot, preferably an earthen one which has also been scalded, and serve from this." Uncle Sam permits not bad tea to come into this country. All our tea is good; bad brewing makes it bad.

Amid the cheers of 75,000 people the giant hulk of the Arizona, the latest battleship in Uncle Sam's navy slid down the ways and out into the waters of the East River. The Arizona, when put into commission will be the largest and most powerful fighting craft in the world. She will even surpass the Queen Elizabeth, the fighting giant of the British Navy. She will mount a battery of 12 fourteen-inch guns, besides smaller rifles and torpedo tubes.

SAFETY ZONE SOUGHT AT CONGESTED CORNER

The problem of traffic congestion at Eighth and Main streets again engaged council's attention last night. Councilman Carter introduced a resolution to have warning posts placed fifty feet from this corner on Main street and North and South Eighth streets, the posts to be painted white and the word "safety" painted on them. These posts would mark the boundary of the area within which vehicles can not be parked.
