

OLD TRAIL MEN PERFECT PLANS FOR BIG MEET

Reports from township organizations indicate a large attendance at the County Old Trails' Road meeting at the Commercial club this evening. Fountain City will send down five automobiles of boosters including the band of that community. Whitewater and Chester have also made plans to attend in large numbers.

Meetings were held at Webster, Fountain City and Whitewater last evening, and enthusiastic sentiment was expressed for the Fourth of July celebration to be held at Centerville. The efforts of certain factions to disrupt the work of holding the celebration has met with failure over the country.

Support Dr. Harold. Sentiment supports the stand taken by President Harold of the county organization, and misstatements regarding alleged opinions of the president have been taken at their face value of not being his expressions.

The townships know that the Richmond delegation has made no effort to swing the celebration to this city, although a certain faction, not belonging to the organization, would like to have the celebration here on account of a baseball game. The Wayne Township Old Trails' Road association, however, has not taken cognizance of this effort of outsiders to influence its members, while the out-county townships are making plans to hold the celebration in Centerville.

BRITISH MEMORANDUM REACHES WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The British memorandum dealing with the seizure by Great Britain of American foods consigned to neutral European ports reached the state department today. It was officially announced. The document will not be made public until it has been studied by Sec. Lansing. Meanwhile the department officials would not indicate whether this note would cause any change to be made in the protest to England on which the department has been working for two months.

ATTACKS SUBMARINE.

BERLIN, June 23.—To back up Germany's charge that British merchant ships are making war on German submarines, the Overseas News Agency today issued the following: "The London Daily Chronicle says that the Anchor line steamer Camerounia from New York with many Americans aboard attempted several times to ram a submarine which finally submerged and disappeared. The story is taken as evidence that should convince America that British captains risk the lives of American passengers and that as long as they follow such tactics no modification can be made in Germany's submarine policy."

TORNADO WRECKS ENTIRE VILLAGE

CLARKSDALE, Miss., June 23.—Reports from Friar's Point, Miss., today give later details of the tornado that almost blew that town of 2,000 away. Practically every store, two oil mills and many residences were demolished. Ten persons were hurt, none seriously.

HAAS MISSES TRAIN; OPPOSES MOVEMENT FOR MORE DAYLIGHT

The agitation in the "more daylight" movement, involving the substitution of eastern time for central time in Ohio and Indiana which it is claimed is pushing steadily westward, will not receive the commendation of Secretary Haas of the Commercial club. Instead, it is more likely to receive his open and frank disapproval.

Cleveland was the first city in the middle west to adopt eastern time. There was a great furor, with many predictions that the affairs of the city, railroad schedules, etc., would be turned topsy-turvy but Mayor Baker of Cleveland declared: "We made the change without the slightest difficulty." Detroit followed Cleveland in May, 1915, in changing its time.

By pushing the clock ahead, and then forgetting it, Detroiters according to busy statisticians, now use 291 hours of fresh sunlight hitherto unused and they save the expense of artificial light.

Secretary Haas in explaining his lack of endorsement to the plan said: "The Lake Erie railroad, I understand was the only line which changed time in Cleveland. I was traveling in that part of the state when the change was made and reached the railroad depot one time to find that I was an hour late for my train. I think the plan is very unsatisfactory."

FARMERS HOLD BACK USING PARCEL POST TO MARKET PRODUCE

Wayne county farmers are unusually slow to grasp the opportunity offered them through the parcel post system in the opinion of Postmaster Beck who declares that no inclination has been shown by them to take advantage of the invitation of the postal officials to assist them in finding a market for their goods.

"The farmers here are fearfully slow," said Postmaster Beck today, "if they would only send in their names, we will forward them on to Chicago where prospective customers could be found."

"Containers for their eggs and produce are made in many factories and one shipment will pay for the cost of one of these containers which can be used many times. We will send them the names of these factories if the farmers will only investigate and show a little initiative."

"The farmers and the consumer can both profit in the sale and purchase of freshly dressed poultry through the parcel post."

"The Parcel post was primarily established for the farmer to enable him to sell his produce. Its inauguration was fought by the business men. Now the farmers are practically ignoring its existence and the business men are profiting by taking advantage of it."

NEW YORK, June 23.—A club without a name, with only three members, but still an institution in the city's life. Such is to be found if you are one of the twenty-five privileged friends of the members, East Thirty-fifth street.

He can hear himself think. There is no jolly life here—for that he probably would go to the racquet and tennis or one of his other clubs—but there is a cook of established reputation and intelligent servants.

The club expenses are borne wholly by the three members, but the twenty-five friends of theirs have a standing invitation to come here for rest.

PLAN CORPORATION TO PUBLISH PAPER OF LABOR UNIONS

Plans for the proposed organization of a corporation to handle the business involved in the publishing of the Richmond Labor Herald, will be discussed at an open call meeting in the Central Labor Council Hall tonight. The proposals will be submitted by the Board of Control of the paper, the members of which were appointed last week and vested with power to control the affairs of the labor paper.

The personnel of the central labor body is changed in semi-annual election and this it is believed, interferes with the desired permanent and profitable establishment of the weekly edition.

The board of control will suggest, probably, ways and means of placing a distinct organization in charge of the publication.
