WILLIAMSBURG, Ind., June 28.—Carl Smith, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Smith, was drowned in the gravel pit of Ollie Scantland, two miles northwest of here, when he was attacked by cramps while wading in the pond with five companions yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock. His body was recovered by Brazil Cates.

The funeral will be held Tuesday at 2 o'clock at Morgan's chapel, the Rev. Logan Hunt officiating.

Young Smith and his companions were wading in the pit when he stepped into a hole twenty feet deep and was attacked by cramps. His companions were unable to help him, and Cates was required to dive several times to recover the body.

for the more years we are granted the more scornful of the gift we grow, though the more insistent, too, in our demand for more. But it was in that first decade, or soon after its ending, that we conceived Antiquity: which is a mere idea, like any other. A century was then ten times our life—not two or three times it, as today. A century is no great matter now; we know men whose cramped existence has equaled a century, or nearly that; and they are only ghosts of men. Our teachers did better than they knew when they taught us Greek or Roman history before they told us of the Norman conquest and the Magna Charta, the Bill of Rights and the French and Indian War, the Declaration of Independence and Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation. We were not grateful then—now we thank them, kneeling. For Rome was founded when we began Roman history, as Mrs. Meynell has written: "and that is why it seems so long ago. By learning something of antiquity in the first ten years, the child enlarges the sense of time for all mankind. A child is beset with long traditions." What year in our matured life, spent in planning conquests of mind or spirit, or treading the daily mill of sense-deadening routine, is half so long as some days of our boyhood, when morning was a spun-out agony of duties protracted, and afternoon a mystically crammed cycle of sport and adventure, and the mere moment of falling asleep an immeasurable bridge between the world we live in and the uncharted Wonderland grown-ups have forgotten?

Dr. A. L. Loop, wife and children, the Misses Belle Conley and Nora Young were dinner guests of Greensburg friends Thursday.


