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Sixth and Mound streets. How many were caught in the wreckage is not known.

Four families were in another house in Sixth street, when it was blown down. How many were injured, or killed, is not known. Rescuers could hear children crying in the wreckage.

Wire Communications All Destroyed.

Attempts to communicate with the river towns in the vicinity of the city were fruitless, as the tornado blew down telegraph and telephone poles as it swept along the city.

Some sections of the city were in darkness on account of the electric light wires being down. The tangle of live wires through the city streets made the progress of rescue parties uncertain and impeded the work of attempting to cast up the total of the storm's damage.

The Bell telephone exchange was in the path of the terrific wind and every pane of glass was shattered.

Large Electric Signs are Destroyed.

Besides the damage to buildings and the loss to the telegraph and telephone companies, traction and electric light companies, thousands of dollars worth of signs were destroyed. Nearly all the large electric signs in downtown district are now masses of tangled wreckage, littering the streets.

CLUB SUGGESTS UNION JUNCTION FOR SIX TRUCKS

Jordan Calls Committee to Arrange Central Station for Convenience of Many Passengers.

BUSES ESTABLISHED

Citizens Ask Extension of Lines to Parts of Richmond Not Reached by the Street Cars.

Drawing in trade from every corner of the county to Richmond and daily growing in popularity both as freight carriers and passenger lines, the various truck lines centering in this city and the jitney buses operating on the city streets, have become established institutions and their systemization and centralization will become a problem for the Commercial club committee on electric railroads.

Charles W. Jordan, chairman of the committee, said today he has called his members together for a meeting this evening to take up this important question. His plan is to bring the various lines together and establish a bus station for passengers and freight, maintained on a pro rata basis by all lines using the central headquarters.

Ask Bus Extensions.

Regarding the jitney bus business, Mr. Jordan said he believes this means of city transportation has come to stay and it is now time it should be regulated. The buses are popular in the city and there seems to be a demand for branch lines off the city car tracks and for a headquarters where jitney buses can be reached by telephone.

"I believe we can gather these lines together under one headquarters," Mr. Jordan said. "None of them are competitors, their only competition being the steam and electric lines. People are asking every day where certain truck lines can be reached. They are inquiring of the means of reaching the jitney buses. I think the establishment of a central station has become a necessity."

There are now six lines operating out of Richmond in this and other counties, reaching twelve or fifteen small towns, increasing the wholesale trade by freight business and aiding the retail trade by the passengers they bring to Richmond.

These lines have terminals in Glen Karn, Economy, Hagerstown, New Paris, Lynn and Liberty.

The committee will take up the proposition of asking the jitney bus owner to establish regular lines to south east Richmond where there are no cars, and to Riverton, using North street, a paved roadway, as the main line.

MUNICIPAL LEAGUE ELECTS MCMAHAN

DISMISSES BIG SUIT AGAINST HAVEN LINE

At yesterday's session of the Indiana Municipal League at Logansport, E. G. McMahan, controller of Richmond, was elected treasurer of the organization. H. K. Volland, mayor of Columbus, was elected president. The 1916 meeting will be at Goshen.

One of the interesting questions discussed was the disposal of garbage, Mayor Robbins of Richmond, taking an active part in the discussion.

He told of the efficient garbage disposal plant constructed in this city this year and of the successful fight against the fly nuisance. By requiring inclosed trash and manure bins and sanitary garbage receptacles, he said, an advanced step in the promotion of improved health conditions had been taken. He also said that with a modern incinerating plant a dollar's worth of coal per day is sufficient to incinerate from five to eight tons of garbage, trash and other debris.

The Richmond delegation which attended the Logansport meeting will return home this evening.

Between New Paris and Richmond that branch of the river was a raging torrent.

Morton Lake Rises.

During the night, the water in the lake rose three feet, spreading over a large territory east of the head of the lake and stopping the current. That utility plants and factories in the river bottom were not flooded, as in 1913 by a rain about equally as heavy, is attributed to the presence of the dam. No fear was expressed that the dam would let loose the enormous force of water behind it, as it

was reinforced when constructed for such conditions.

Short creek went on a rampage during the night and washed out a stone bridge at the foot of Beeler's hill. The bottoms were flooded, and hay, wheat and oats were ruined. The road is washed away and is closed against travel today. The force of the water had been spent this morning and receded rapidly. Some of the standing crops in the neighborhood will be total losses.

Telephones and telegraph companies suffered to some extent on country lines. Few city phones were out of commission today.

An unusually heavy rain with little damage except to standing crops was reported at Cambridge City. From the northern part of the county came reports of many culverts washed from the roads.
