

STROKE FLOORS MOTORMAN ON CAR TO MILTON

MILTON, Ind., July 9.—A very heavy rain accompanied by much electricity and considerable wind visited Milton, late Wednesday evening. The rain fell for over four hours and it is thought that the fall on the level was from two to three inches. The branch that threads the west and north side of Milton, gathers a large volume of water from the hills west of town where it begins and as it came into town the slope to the river carried it away from the west part and near the corner of the school grounds the arch was too small to let the water through and it went out of its banks, flooding the north part of town.

Yards, cellars and streets formed a receptacle for the avalanche of water pouring over the top of the branch and the north part of town had the appearance of a mud lake. Chicken coops went floating about and men were wading about at ten o'clock attempting to rescue the perishing. H. D. Huddleston had to get ropes and other means for getting his auto out of its dilemma. The river was also high but not out of its banks. In several instances gardens and flowers were covered with mud and clay.

Clyde Dalley, motorman on the interurban car between Cambridge City and Milton was shocked by a current of lightning as he was nearing Milton on one of his trips, Wednesday evening. He was thrown backwards, but uninjured.
