## SHORTS MAKE BID FOR SEPT. WHEAT

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—September wheat was the feature of the day, as it was bid up by the shorts from 95¢ to 99¢ and it closed at 99¢, which was 4¢ above the closing last night. The cash wheat premiums were higher and there was an urgent demand for it from millers and others with offerings small. Corn was up 3¢. Oats were up 1¢ to 6¢, but hog products were 2½¢ to 5¢ lower.

Cash wheat sales were 50,000 bu. No. 2 red in store at \$1.15. The cash business in wheat was restricted by the inability of those wanting it to secure supplies. Cash corn sales were 45,000 bu, and oats 110,000 bu.

## FELL GERMAN PLANE BEARING 16 CROSSES

PARIS, Sept. 10.—Six German aeroplanes flew over Nancy, dropping thirty bombs, causing material damage and killing two persons and wounding ten, it was announced today. The German aeroplanes also dropped bombs on St. Max, a suburb of Nancy, where several victims are reported. French artillery fired at the German machines and French aviators started in pursuit. One of the German machines

was damaged by the shell fire. A German aeroplane adorned with sixteen iron crosses was forced to descend near Calais because its tank was pierced by a bullet. The machine was captured and its two occupants made prisoners.
