SHORTS MAKE BID FOR SEPT. WHEAT

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—September wheat was the feature of the day, as it was bid up by the shorts from 95½ to 99½ and it closed at 99½, which was 4½c above the closing last night. The cash wheat premiums were higher and there was an urgent demand for it from millers and others with offerings small. Corn was up ½c. Oats were up ¼c to 5c, but hog products were 2½ to 5c lower.

Cash wheat sales were 50,000 bu. No. 2 red in store at \$1.15. The cash business in wheat was restricted by the inability of those wanting it to secure supplies. Cash corn sales were 45,000 bu., and oats 110,000 bu.
