WHEAT STAYS STRONG DESPITE BEAR NEWS

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Strength in the cash wheat situation offset all bearish news today, and while local bears made efforts to depress the market at times, the finish was about the top, with net gains of 1/4c to 16c, the latter on December. Buying of December and local traders narrowed the spread to 1/4c to 16c at the last against 2c Thursday.

Despite heavy buying corn reacted at the last and closed 1/4c to 16c lower. Oats were lower. Shipping demands for the grain were fair. Corn sales were 75,000 bushels and oats \$125,000.

Buying by packers closed provisions at the top with net gains of 10c to 15c on pork and 76c to 15c on lard and ribs.

A record movement of spring wheat has been on in the north west the past week.
