

CHILDREN TAKE REST WHILE INSTRUCTORS CONVENE AT CAPITAL

Practically all arrangements have been completed for the attendance of Richmond and Wayne county teachers at the annual State Teachers' association convention which will be held for three days in Indianapolis.

All the schools in the city and county will close this afternoon and not open again until next Monday morning. Garfield school closed last night to permit the teachers of that building to visit the schools at Crawfordsville and elsewhere in the state.

The total number of school teachers in the county, 250 in all, will be in attendance at the convention as is required by law. Of this number approximately 65 will make the trip in the "special" interurban car which leaves the Richmond station at 7:00 o'clock Thursday morning. The company has declared its willingness to take those teachers who cannot arrange to go on the special, on the limited car which leaves at 7:30 o'clock for the same price. All tickets are limited to three days.

Superintendent J. T. Giles of the city schools left this morning for Indianapolis to be present at the opening of the convention meeting.

BELGIAN MINISTER ASKS AID OF U. S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—E. Havent, minister from Belgium to the United States, has appealed to Secretary of State Lansing to intervene with Germany on behalf of 32 prisoners, presumably Belgians, who have been sentenced to death by a German court martial in Belgium it was heard today. Secretary Lansing instructed Ambassador Gerard at Berlin to investigate the cases and if the action would be proper to make representations to the German foreign office in behalf of the condemned persons.

UNION TAILOR DIES IN CHICAGO STRIKE

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—One striking unionist is dead and three other men were suffering from gunshot wounds today, the result of a riot last night in connection with the strike of clothing workers in Chicago. Samuel Kappner, aged 35, a deaf and dumb tailor who was on picket duty, was shot and fatally wounded and three other men, one a bystander, were slightly wounded in the rioting, in which about ten shots were fired. Tony Panichi, a nonunion man, was arrested shortly afterward, charged with the shooting. He confessed he had fired one shot, and there was one empty chamber in his revolver. A score of persons who were near when the rioting started, were arrested as witnesses. Many of the prisoners taken were girls.
