The map shows the scene of operations in Volhynia in eastern Galicia, where the Russians have launched a new offensive. Czernowitz, capital of the Bukovina, the key to the Carpathians, the big Galician city, and Czartorysk, on the Kovel-Barny railroad, are the chief points now bitterly contested. The battle line, 300 miles long, stretches from Volhynia through Bessarabia, and is now close to the Rumanian frontier. A total of about 3,000,000 men is believed to be engaged.

Cruiser Natal is Blown Up



BRITISH CRUISER NATAL.

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H. M. S. Natal, a British armored cruiser, which blew up, "by internal explosion" in a harbor, according to an Admiralty report. About 400 of the Natal's crew of 723 were saved.

In 1912 the Natal spent two weeks in New York harbor after conveying the body of White-law Reid, American Ambassador to England, to this country from Portsmouth. The Natal is the third British warship blown up in harbor, by "internal" explosion. The bulwark blew up in Sheerness Harbor on Nov. 26, 1914, and the Princess Irene was destroyed by a similar explosion in Sheerness Harbor, May 27, 1915.
