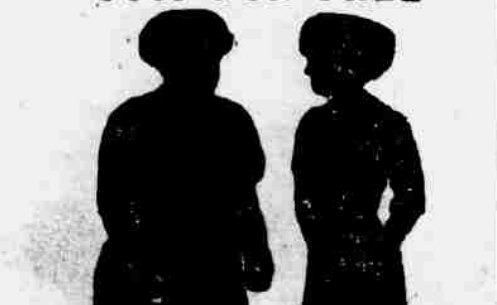
## TO ARREST SPITTERS.

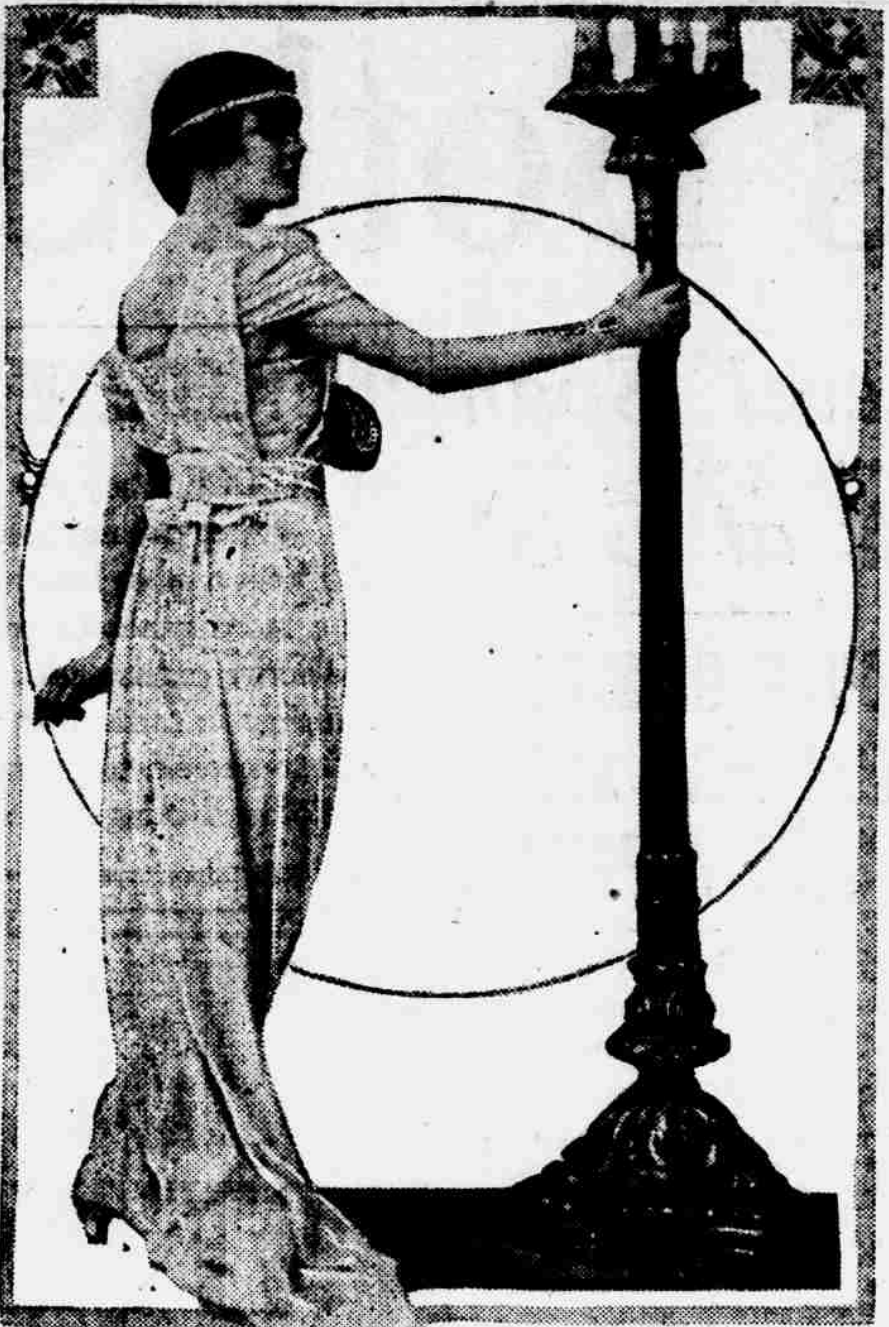
