The Republicans elect the same officials who have been serving for some time, Oliver Lafuze, chairman; Burton Clark, secretary, and R. C. Connor, treasurer.


G. W. Robertson and James O'Toole are the retiring secretary and treasurer of the Democratic committee.




Scene of Villa's Repulse by American Troops



U. S. Troops Guarding El Paso International Span now Closed to Traffic


