

WORLD COURT CAN NOT END WORLD WARS

NEW YORK, May 4.—The head of the United States army in 1912 feared a great invasion was imminent.

The present war could not have been prevented by a world court.

No war in the last century has resulted from any justifiable cause.

These are some of the striking statements in the speech of Leslie M. Shaw, former secretary of the treasury, before the World Court Congress this afternoon.

He said in part: "I crossed the Atlantic in 1912 with the head of the United States army (Major General Leonard Wood was then chief of staff) who, filled with apprehension, regretted his mission, for he freely expressed the opinion that he would not be able to return until he would be at war with a certain great European nation that could whip us to a standstill in sixty days.

"It could then and it can now, if free of the death struggle in which it is locked, capture this city and everything within a hundred and seventy-five miles thereof in thirty days.

"Now, this brings me to the question, how we, as God-fearing men and women, filled with patriotism and with regard for our fellows may best play the part and do all we can to avert disaster, and prevent a repetition of what no words of mine to paint as the worst calamity that has thus far visited the race. If this organization sought in the slightest degree to prevent preparedness for eventualities that may ensue, or if it sought to lull to sleep the apprehension of the thoughtful, I never would have joined."

CHEAPE, POLO STAR, ON MISSING LIST



Captain Leslie S. C. Cheape, the famous polo player, is reported missing in a recent casualty report.

Captain Cheape was a member of the English polo teams which visited New York in 1911 and 1912, in a futile endeavor to take back home the international polo trophy held by the Meadowbrook club. He also came to this country in 1914, as one of Lord Wimborne's four, which won the cup. The victory of the Englishmen was due in a great measure to the remarkable skill with the mallet and the daring horsemanship of Captain Cheape.

U. S. INSTALLS EFFICIENCY PLAN

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The State Department has installed an efficiency system that may result in the dropping of a number of employees. The system is called a "decided advance" over other systems in operation in some of the departments.

A special efficiency board appointed by Secretary of State Lansing, consisting of Assistant Secretary Osborn, Director Carr of the Consular Bureau and Chief Clerk Ben Davis, put the system into effect to obtain better service from employees.

All promotions for places paying salaries of \$1,800 or less are to be filled by the efficiency board's recommendations, which are to be based on "ability, efficiency, faithful performance of duty and good conduct." Secretary Lansing will personally designate who shall be appointed to places paying more than \$1,800 a year when vacancies occur.

When employees fall below a certain standard they are liable to dismissal. Those whose work is rated as being above a certain standard are put on a list of available for promotions.

HOLD HOME BUILDING.

GARY, Ind., May 4.—Live-wire business men of Gary have arranged for a "Home Building Fair" to be held from May 15 to May 20, for the purpose of encouraging sentiment in favor of home building and home ownership by Gary citizens. A large building will be used for the exhibit.

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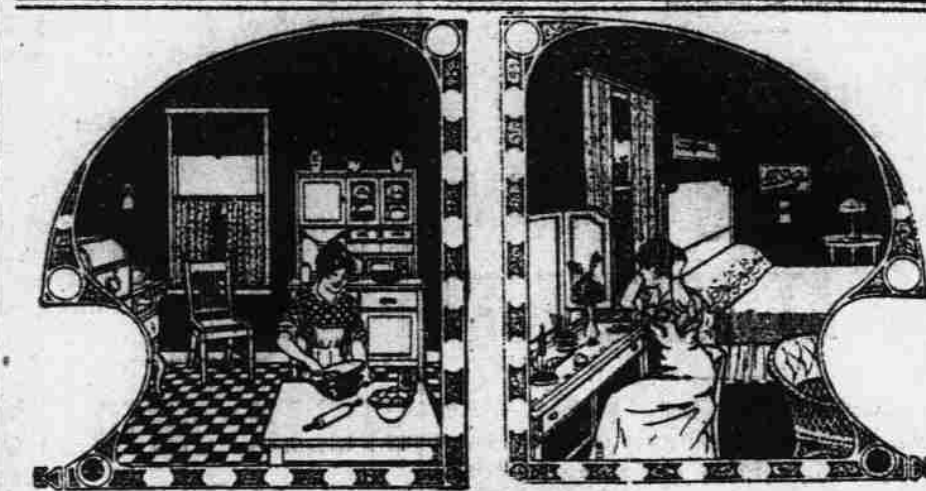
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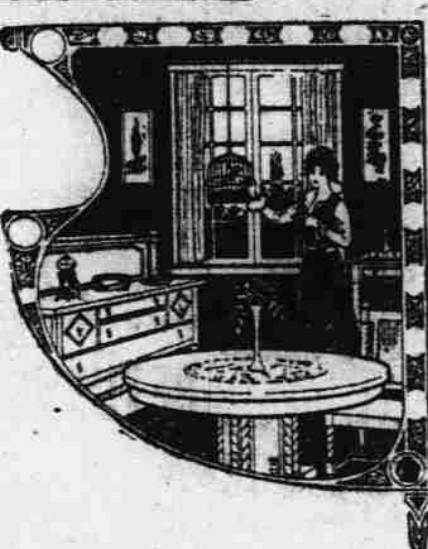


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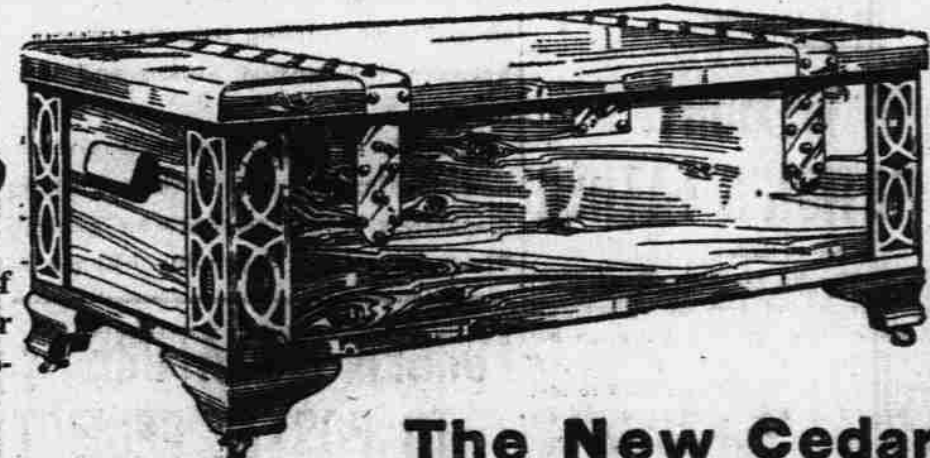
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
