## RECORDS OF 1853 FOUND IN VAULT OF COURT HOUSE

EATON, O., June 1.—Records seventy-five years old have been found in Preble county's court house, and furnish convincing evidence that this day and age is truly one of high cost.

Two contracts bearing date of 1853 show that the school directors at the village of Gratts paid Mary A. Gram and Christina Thomas \$50 each for teaching school sixty-five days at that place.

Another receipt shows that the county bought four cords of wood for the prosecuting attorney for a consideration of \$3.75.

An order in payment for one day's fee as witness and mileage of fifty-six miles involved an expenditure of \$2.43.

## BARS IN WINNIPEG MUST CLOSE NOW

WINNIPEG, Manitoba, June 1.—Today was the last day on which liquor can be legally sold over the bar and in warehouses in Manitoba. Householders will be allowed to have liquor on their premises, but hotels, rooming houses and other places are barred. Of the sixty-six hotels in Winnipeg, one-third will go out of business.
