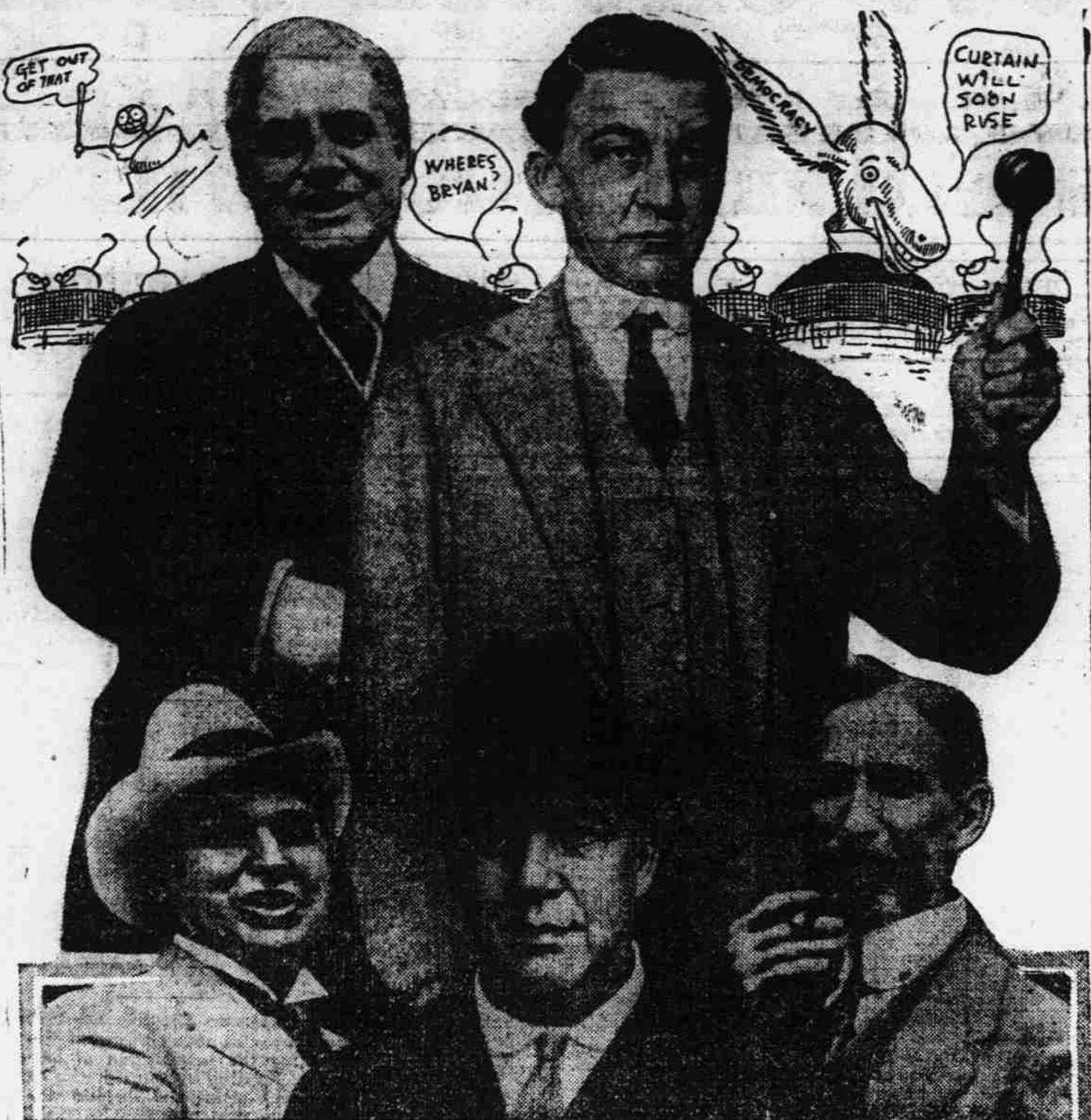

RUSH MUSSELMAN TO LOCAL HOSPITAL; DIES FROM WOUND

FATON, O., June 16.—His skull fractured and depressed, right cheek bone crushed and right ear torn almost off, David J. Musselman, a member of the firm of Musselman & Co., owners of an elevator here, was rushed to Reid Memorial hospital, Richmond, Ind. He died Friday at the hospital.

While at work in the elevator making adjustments to machinery Musselman fell about eight feet, alighting upon his head. S. W. Ridenour, employed in the elevator, was near, but failed to see whether Musselman was knocked off by a belt or merely lost his balance. Ridenour and other friends picked up the injured man and summoned Dr. J. C. Ryder, who gave him emergency attention, and then advised that he be removed to the hospital.
