

## JAMES NOTES MEN'S CHANGE TO DRY RANKS

This was an expression made today by Rev. H. S. James, president of the Richmond Ministerial association.

The Rev. Mr. James said that although he never favored a death sentence for a man, he believed Carr should have been sent to the electric chair if such a course is ever justifiable.

"I am glad, however, that he will have time to repent," said the dean of Richmond pastors.

## PARALYSIS CLAIMS VICTIM EACH HOUR

NEW YORK, July 13.—Twenty-four deaths from infantile paralysis was the official record today for the past twenty-four hours, an increase of seven over the day before. Of these, eighteen occurred in Brooklyn. There are now 682 cases of the disease being treated in hospitals, most of them in King's county.

## STOCK ALL CREEKS WITH FINE BASS

Between twenty-five and fifty thousand small bass will be liberated in the Wayne county streams from the Game and Fish Protective Association ponds, John Holaday, president of the association said today.

This will by far be the largest number that have been liberated. The spawning pond was not very successful last year because the big bass and the young one had to be kept in the same pond.

The new arrangement is a much more successful plan, Mr. Holaday said. Now there is a wintering pond, a hatching pond and a pool for the young fish.

The young bass are now about an inch long and are large enough to be liberated now but they will be retained until some time in September. This will give the fish a very good start and fewer of them will die when liberated, it is urged.

## EXPECT STATE TO GET SLICE OF ROAD FUND

The federal good roads bill has passed both houses of congress and was signed by President Wilson last Tuesday. Under its provision Indiana will receive more than \$2,000,000 for road building and road improvement, provided the state establishes a highway department, but if Indiana refuses to establish such a department, she will lose that aid from the government.

Wayne county has headed a movement to secure the establishment and now the entire Sixth district is organized for the purpose of getting the establishment of such a department, with Joseph Mills, Richmond, president.

Mr. Mills said today that the Sixth district association believes that there is no doubt but that the next legislature will provide for a commission and it is now devoting its time to getting the citizens of the state interested in this commission so that the best kind available will be put into force. The plan is to get each district to prepare a bill and then have the legislature take the best parts out of all the district drafts.

Unless something like this is done, Indiana will in all probability get a bad law, just like Ohio has, Mr. Mills explained today.

A few men cannot frame a law to suit all the people and under the plan which is being fostered by the Sixth District association, all the citizens would have a chance to offer their suggestions.

## PARDON GRANTED ROBERT FUTRELL

Fifteen years ago last February, Robert Futrell, colored, confessed slayer of his sweetheart, requested that Judge Fox sentence him to be hanged rather than be sentenced to prison for life.

Yesterday prison officials informed Futrell that he had been pardoned by Governor Ralston. Futrell will be given his freedom at once. During his fifteen years of penal confinement Futrell has been a model prisoner. His freedom is his reward.

Futrell, who was employed in Richmond at the time he murdered his sweetheart, is a native of Mound City, Iowa. He has no relatives in Richmond, though he is fairly well known there.

## THREE PERSONS DIE IN POWDER FACTORY

HASKILL, N. J., July 13.—At least three persons were killed and fifteen others were injured by an explosion in the Ballite mill of the DePont Powder works here today. Two buildings were destroyed. So terrific was the force of the explosion that persons two miles away were knocked to the ground.
