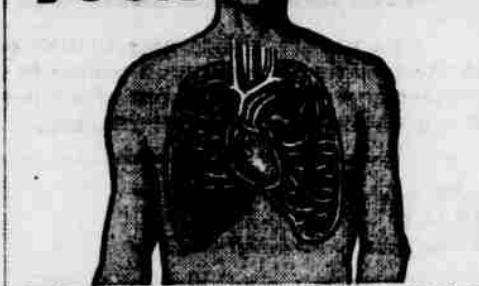
SLAYER OF WIFE, DYING IN HOSPITAL IS THOUGHT INSANE



William Howell Ellis, who slew his wife and then fired a bullet into his own brain at their home in Bethlehem, Pa., is dying in the Chestnut Hill hospital. Physicians say there is no hope for the man's recovery and that only his extraordinary vitality has kept him alive this long. Nervous derangement culminating in an uncontrollable homicidal mania is believed by officials investigating the

case to have impelled Ellis to kill his wife. Letters found in the rooms occupied by the couple showed that Ellis had long been in ill-health. Some of the letters, written by the wife to her husband, expressed solicitude for Ellis's condition, and hope that fits of despondency and gloom, from which he had suffered, had passed.

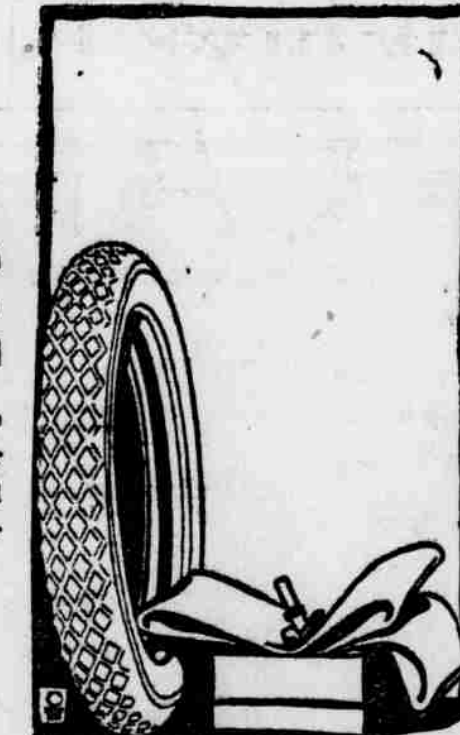

Council Demands This Ordinance:

Requiring Privy Vaults and Cess Pools to be Connected with Sewers, where practical to do so, providing penalties for the violation of its provisions.

Here Is The Penalty:

SECTION 3—Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined any sum of not less than one (\$1.00) dollar and not more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense, and each day that any such vault or cess pool is used or maintained in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.
