

COMSTOCK PRAISED BY NOTED ATTORNEY AT GLENWOOD RALLY

GLENWOOD, Ind., Nov. 2.—Samuel D. Miller, well-known attorney of Indianapolis, who is the senior member of the firm of Miller, Dailey and Thompson, with which his father, the venerable Wm. H. H. Miller, former Attorney-General of the United States, was identified during the active years of his practice, addressed a large and enthusiastic audience here last night. Mr. Miller discussed the violation of American rights under the present Democratic administration, the enactment of the Adamson law, and the Democratic slogan, "He kept us out of war," but the feature of his address was a discussion of the merits of the Republican candidates for governor and United States senator. Mr. Miller also referred to the career of Judge D. W. Comstock, Republican candidate for congress in the Sixth district.

"There is a gentleman, who is your candidate for Congress in this District. I refer to Judge Daniel W. Comstock, a courtly gentleman, a man of ripe years, wisdom and experience, a high-minded, conscientious American, a fit man to represent this great District in the Congress of the United States. I am sure that you will do all that you can to insure his election," he said.






