### GOVERNMENT SPANKS BOY

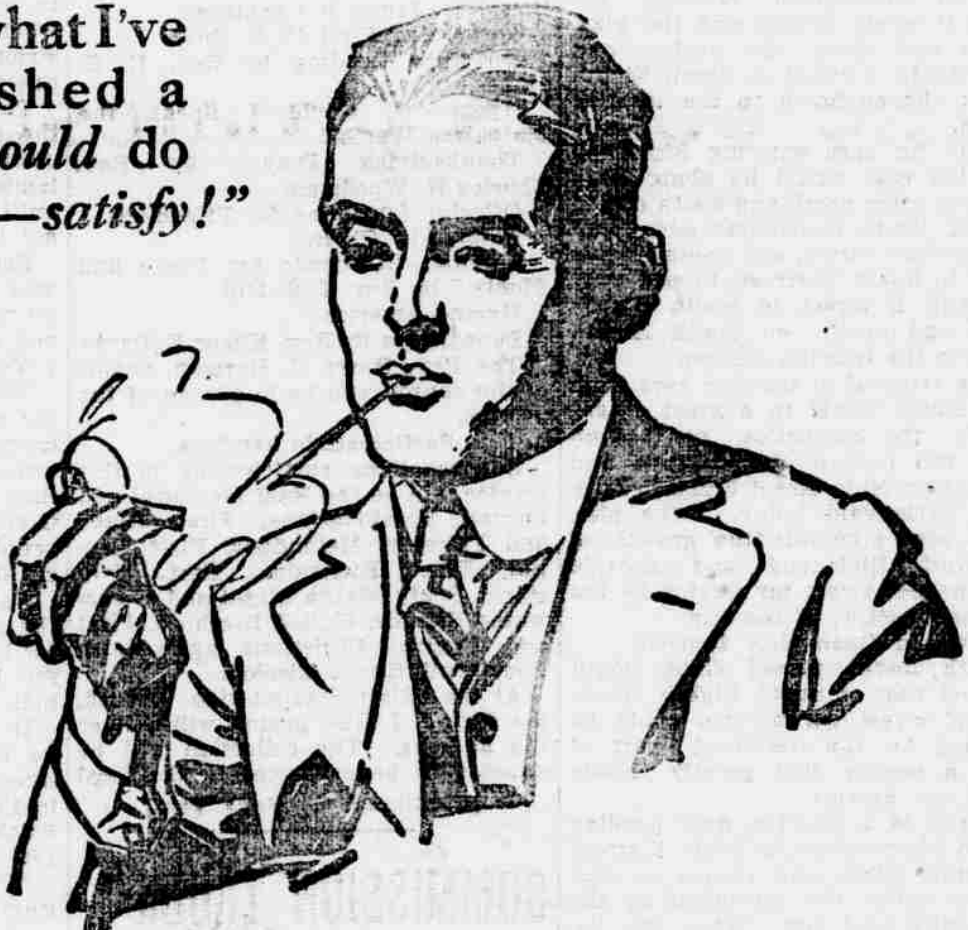
