ECONOMY, Ind., Jan. 1.—Dieting squads everywhere are trying to solve the high cost of living problem. H. D. Ballenger, an Economy boy, who is now located at Oklahoma City, Okla., is at the head of a diet squad, including his brother, Joe Ballenger and R. Ballard, who have demonstrated one person can live on fourteen and one-half cents a day. That amount buys sufficient food to sustain life properly without luxuries. The test was of two weeks' duration and the following is the menu for the first and last days:

Duryea, who in 1914 shot and killed his father, General Hiram Duryea, in their Bay Ridge home, has arrived from Bordeaux to lecture and raise funds for war relief work. She is the only daughter of Franklin Waldo Smith, of Boston, and has made a separation ten years prior to the shooting of her father-in-law. Mrs. Duryea has aided and clothed more than 53,000 persons in France since the war started, and has been decorated by the French government with the Medaille d'Or des Etrangers.
