Just before the Senate adjourned this morning, until 10 o'clock Friday morning, Lieutenant-Governor Bush directed the attention of the upper house of the general assembly to the fact that to date there had been introduced in this chamber 107 bills, upon which only twenty-eight had received committee action and reports. This is regarded by the lieutenant-governor as a too small proportion and he urged the senators to "get busy" and stave off, what he termed the inevitable avalanche at the close of the session.

Six New Bills Presented. Six new bills were introduced in the Senate and the Simmons bill securing the right of a beneficiary to contest the probate of a will wherein such action might under the terms of the will disinherit contestants as passed by a vote of 46 yeas.

Among other measures introduced were the following: Hagerty—Establishing in each congressional district a court of one attorney to be appointed by the governor or for hearing on industrial accidents; abolishing the state bureau of inspection and making the state industrial board a court of review and reducing salaries of the industrial board from \$4,000 a year to \$1,500. The appointees to be paid from \$900 to \$1,200 a year.

Heirship is Fixed. Van Auker—Fixing the heirship of property left by a person of unsound mind, with no direct heirs, in son-in-law or daughters-in-law. Senator Beardsley—joint resolution asking for clean towels and an improved service in the senate cloak room went to the committee on public health.

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children. This would be an advanced step in the preparedness movement."

Johnston is Enthusiastic.

Dr. Johnston stated that he was an enthusiastic advocate of universal military training in the United States.

He stated that he favored a preliminary course of military training in the schools, to be completed with at least a year of service with the colors in the federal army.

"Our boys, beginning at the age of ten or twelve, should be taught the use of the rifle and fundamental drill lessons and military tactics," said Dr. Johnston. "At the age of eighteen every boy physically able to do so should be called to the colors for one year's field service, at the end of which time he would be discharged into the reserve."

"This is our nation and the young men must be prepared to protect it. It is the plan pursued by that most

democratic of all republics, Switzerland. Military training for our boys and young men cannot hurt them. On the other hand it will better their physical condition and teach them discipline, self-denial and co-operation. This training cannot help to improve American manhood and absolutely guarantee the republic from foreign aggression."

## RATLIFF PREPARES OFFICIAL ARTICLES ON INDIANA BIRDS

An official text on Indiana birds, the second state article on birds for scholastic use ever prepared in the country, is being written by Walter Ratliff to be included in the next report of Prof. Edward Barrett, state geologist. Mr. Ratliff, in accepting the request of Prof. Barrett, said he will write about 60 native Indiana birds and have color plates prepared to preface each account.

The selection of Mr. Ratliff to write the first official Indiana report on native birds is a tribute to his wide and accurate knowledge and to the perfection of his work for the government in reporting winter and summer birds of the field and orchard.

Wayne county is practically the only one where school children are taught something intimate of the native birds. Mr. Ratliff has been giving a series of lectures on birds, illustrated with mounted specimens and on historical events of the county. Prof. Barrett said there is an insistent demand everywhere in the state for a work of the kind Mr. Ratliff agreed to prepare.

The 60 page manuscript will be completed about the middle of February, but it will be June before the color plates have been finished and approved.

### LEAPLEY CASE SETTLED

Appeal of Quinn Leapley from the award of the town board of Centerville for damages to property caused by the opening of an alley has been settled out of court. Judge Fox reported today. The compromise calls for \$75 damages, the costs to be divided. The original award was \$50. Leapley in his appeal to the circuit court asked for \$600.
