STRENGTH DEVELOPS IN WHEAT MARKETS WHEN LINERS SAIL

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Strength developed in the wheat market today largely on account of reports of the departure of 23 merchant ships from the Virginia capes bound for Europe and covered by speedy British cruisers. Favorable weather conditions for more efficient operating by the railroads, tended further to encourage the bulls.

It was asserted also that, as the belated reports now needed more urgently than power and shell, the chances of adequate transportation facilities for grain were likely to continue to improve. Opening prices, which ranged from 1 to 2 1/2% higher, with May at \$1.75 to \$1.77 and July at \$1.51 to \$1.52 1/2, were followed by something of a reaction and then a fresh upturn.

Corn rose with wheat but soon ran into liberal selling and then began to sag. The bears were inclined to emphasize the prospect that mild temperatures would lessen demand for feed. After opening 1/4 to 1/2% higher and hardening a little more, the market declined to below Saturday's finish.

Lightness of offerings gave firmness to oats. Dealers seemed to be watching the action of wheat rather than that of corn.

Provisions showed no important change. Business was only of a scattering character.

BALL MAGNATES HOLD SESSIONS TO DECIDE FATE

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Major and minor baseball magnates from all parts of the country are gathering here today for what is expected to be one of the most momentous series of conferences in the history of the national game.

The National League will set the ball rolling with its reconvened annual meeting and schedule meeting this afternoon which will be followed by the meeting of the National Commission tomorrow. On Thursday, the American League club owners will gather to pass on the schedule and to consider matters previous to the opening of the pennant season, while on Friday the International League will meet in New York to prepare the 1917 schedule and to discuss the baseball situation in the minor league financial situation.

Change Financial Rules.
During these various meetings there will be a number of general conferences at which there will be discussion of the trouble with the players' franchise, changes in the rules governing the financial arrangements of the world's series, proposed reduction in the size of the playing squads, conduct of baseball in case of war and other matters in connection with the usual efforts to trade or purchase players.

Several changes in the playing rules have been suggested by both players and fans since the closing of the 1916 playing season, but it is not likely that the joint committee on rules will take any drastic action this year. The spit ball may be doomed after the 1917 season is completed but other changes which have been spoken of to strengthen the offense of the game may go over for consideration probably a year hence.

MOONEY APPEARS TO HEAR PENALTY

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13.—Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of murder last Friday in connection with a bomb explosion during a Preparedness day parade last July is to appear today in the superior court where he will receive the death sentence. The jury found Mooney guilty of murder in the first degree and with no recommendation for leniency, making it obligatory on the court to impose the extreme penalty.

Mooney's attorneys have announced that a new trial will be asked.

FREIGHT BLOCKADE SERIOUS IN WEST

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Refusal of eastern railroads to accept shipments, owing to the submarine embargo, is causing an almost unprecedented congestion of loaded freight cars in western terminals, according to officials of western trunk lines.

Steps were being taken here today to relieve the situation by adopting the measures taken by eastern railroads. Orders were sent out from the operating departments of several of the western roads to refuse shipments billed to destinations east of Chicago or the Atlantic seaboard, unless guarantee of storage facilities were presented.

In the Chicago yards, according to officials of the Rock Island, there are more than 900 loaded cars consigned to the Atlantic seaboard from points on the Rock Island alone. Most of these contain grain for export. Eastern roads will not handle the cars until swift clearance is assured. Seven hundred additional cars are at other Rock Island terminals.

Northwestern officials also admit that they are facing a problem in keeping their rolling stock moving eastward, and in supplying empty cars to western shippers.

ITALIAN PLANES RAID NAVY YARD

ROME, Feb. 13.—Italian seaplanes caused considerable damage in an air raid on the San Rocco navy yard near Trieste on Sunday night, according to an official statement by the admiralty. The statement says that a number of bombs were dropped causing the outbreak of an extensive fire. All of the machines, which belonged to the Upper Adriatic Squadron returned safely.

ZEITUNG WARNS U. S. OF FATE AWAITING SHIPS

LONDON, Feb. 13.—"If President Wilson wishes to make an attempt to break the German blockade, the American government must be responsible for what happens," says the Berlin Vossische Zeitung, in commenting on the report that two American merchant vessels had left for the blockaded zone, according to the Exchange Telegraph company's Copenhagen correspondent.

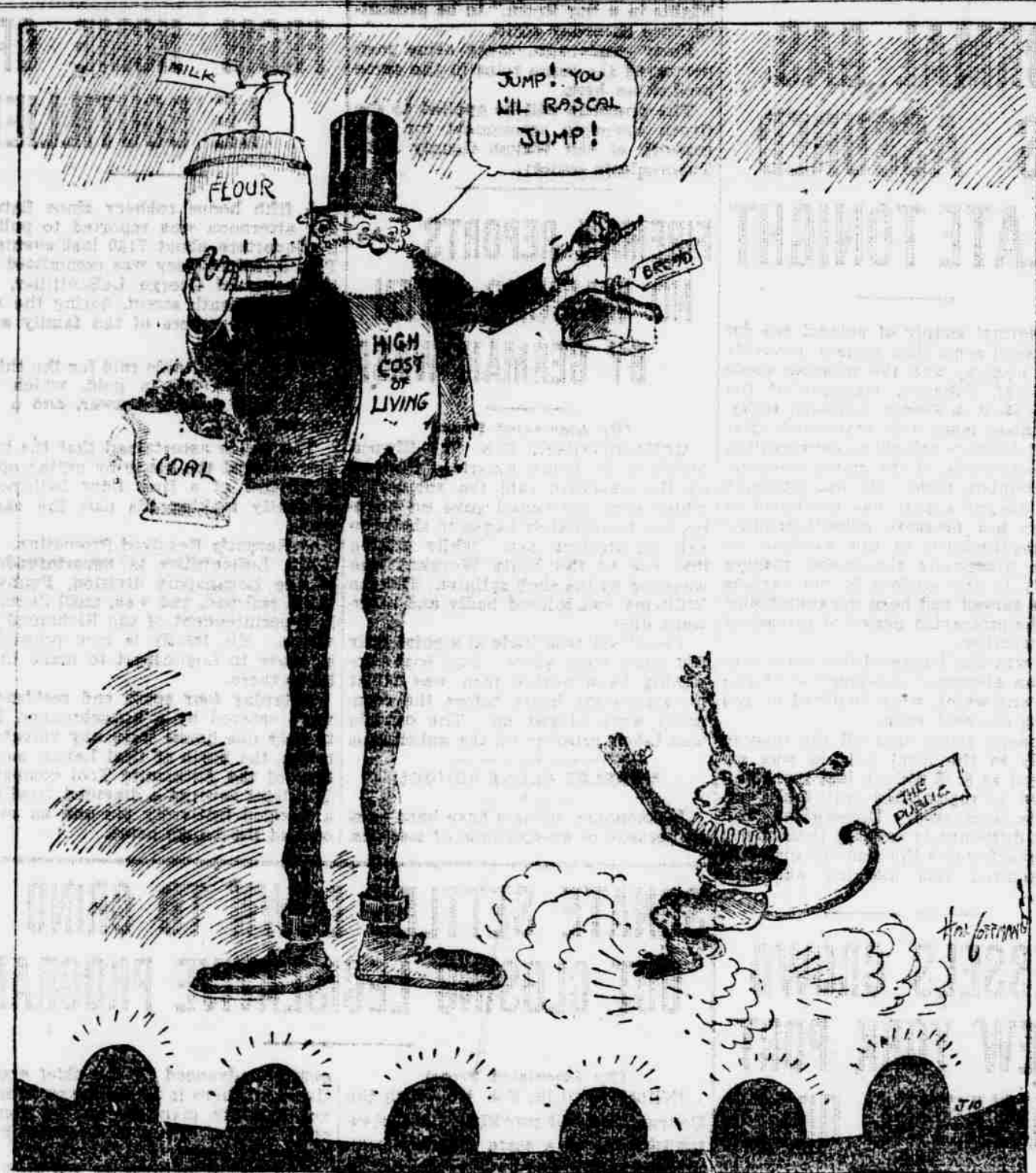
The correspondent reports that the announcement of the vessels' departure had caused a pronounced sensation in Berlin.

The American vessels referred to doubtless are the unarmed freight steamers Orleans and Rochester, which sailed from New York for Bordeaux on Saturday.
