FIRST ENGLISH LUTHERANS DEDICATE \$12,000 IMPROVEMENT TO CHURCH

Improvements made to First English Lutheran church, which is to be rededicated tomorrow, total nearly \$12,000.

Much of this was contributed by individuals, however, so the burden on the congregation is not large. No offering will be taken tomorrow for the improvements.

Adam H. Bartel gave the new pipe organ, which cost about \$5,000, art windows were given by Mrs. Anna and Miss Emma Engelbrecht, Miss Alice Knollenberg, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Romey, J. M. Engstrom, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Nussbaum, two by Henry Knollenberg, and one by J. E. Peltz and daughters, Misses Mary and Ruth.

Work done by individuals. The indirect lighting system was installed by the Women's Aid society, a pulpit Bible by John Decker, a sounding apparatus by Elton Louck, offering plates by Miss Ella Minter, book markers by Miss Mae Ross and vases by Lee B. Nussbaum's class.

An immense asbestos curtain, separating the auditorium from the Sunday school room, has been installed. The rooms, when thrown together, will seat 800 persons.

Two former pastors, the only ones the church has had, will preach. Rev.

J. W. Kapp, of First Lutheran church, Cincinnati, will preach in the morning and Rev. E. G. Howard, of Wheeling, W. Va., in the evening. Dr. Kapp founded this church.

Dedication services in the morning service will be in charge of the pastor, Rev. F. A. Drossel. Pastors of St. Paul's and Second Lutheran church will bear greetings from their congregations.

Miss Alice Knollenberg, church organist, will preside at the new organ.


