Baseball Promoters Meet Monday to Complete Club Organization

Joseph H. Mills, chairman of the committee of Richmond business men who are organizing the Richmond Amusement company for the purpose of taking over a franchise for Richmond in the Central Baseball League,

today issued a call for a meeting of all the stockholders in the company, to be held at the Commercial club rooms at 7:30 Monday evening.

At present there are about 350 stockholders in this company and Mr. Mills points out that it is important for all stockholders to attend the meeting Monday evening as the company will be incorporated at that time and other important questions will come up for discussion.

Stockholders to Incorporate.
After the company is incorporated the stockholders will elect officers of the company and a board of directors; the committee appointed to arrange for a baseball park will submit its report and the question of the issuance and distribution of season tickets will be discussed.

All details connected with the organization of the local Central league club must be discussed and disposed of at the Monday evening meeting as that at 2 o'clock, p. m., on Monday, April 2, 1917, on the premises to be sold, said Commissioner will offer for sale at public auction and at not less than two-thirds of the full appraised value thereof, the following described real estate in Wayne County, Indiana, to-wit:

To consult with good business men on all questions of public service or interest.

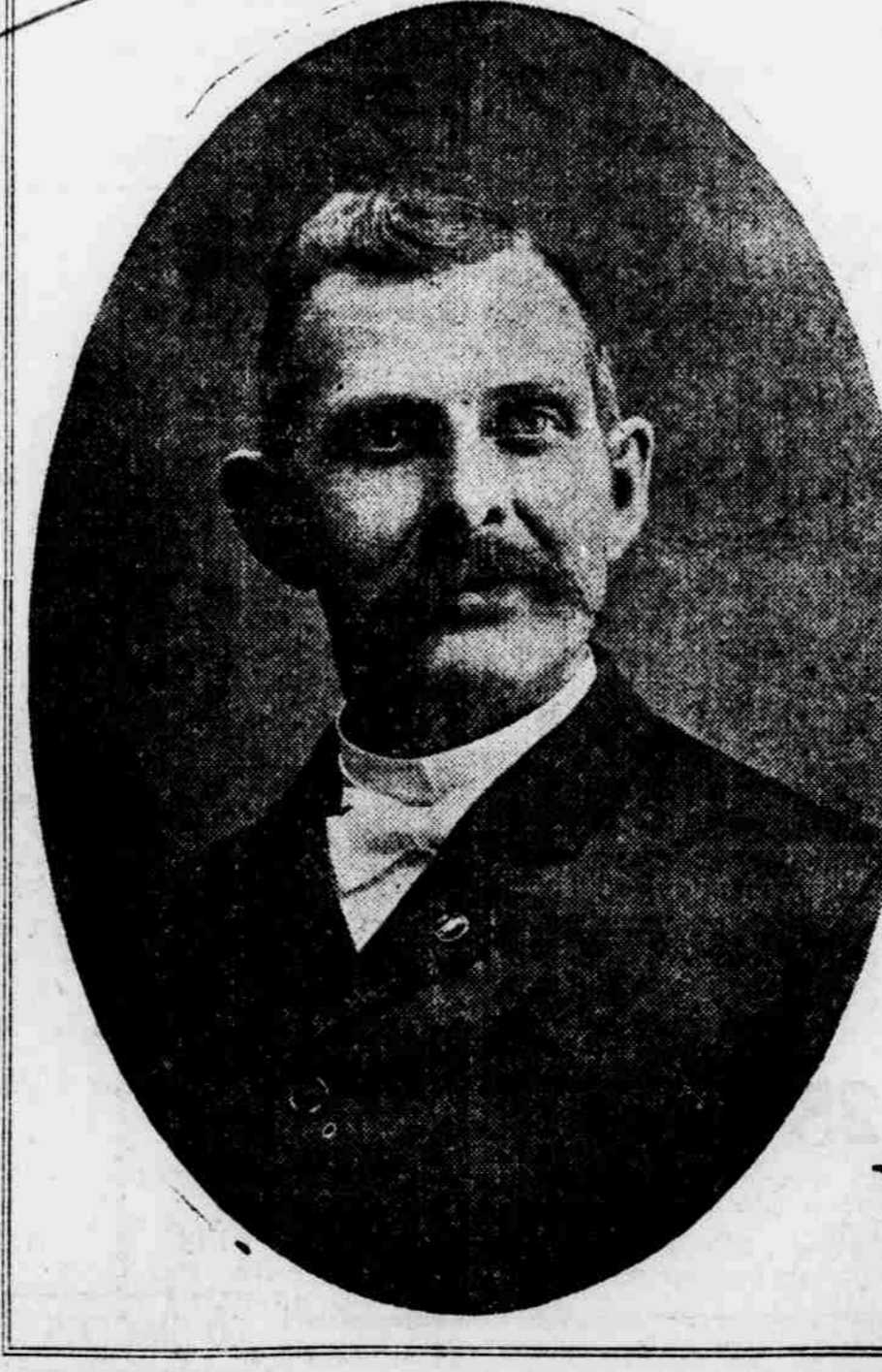
To go forward with public improvements as fast as possible, keeping the streets and alleys in as good condition as the public treasury will permit.
