TAFT WILL DELIVER DEFENSE LECTURES ALL OVER COUNTRY

NEW YORK, March 6.—Arguments for adequate preparedness for national defense and for a league of nations to enforce peace after the war will be presented in addresses by former President Taft in a number of cities of the south and southwest, between March 21 and 29. His itinerary, given out today by the League to Enforce Peace, of which he is president: Richmond, March 21; Greensboro, N. C., March 22; Atlanta, March 23; Birmingham, March 24; Nashville, March 25; Memphis, March 26; morning, Little Rock, evening, Dallas, Tex., March 27; Oklahoma City, March 28 and 29.
