Esther Griffin White has announced an engagement of the Russian Symphony orchestra at the Coliseum for Sunday afternoon, April 29.

Laura C. Gaston is to direct a recital by Fanning and Turpin probably in First Presbyterian church during the latter part of April. Fanning is a pleasing vocalist and Turpin a sympathetic accompanist. They are Dayton men.

Outlying communities have supplied a goodly share of the patronage for the Galli-Curci concert. Orders for tickets have been received from Dublin, Milton, Cambridge City, Newcastle, Hagerstown, Greensboro, Centerville, Liberty, Connerville, College Corner, Campbellstown, Dayton, Eaton, West Alexandria, Fountain City and Winchester.


