

HOLDS PRESIDENT IS BEST FRIEND PEOPLE OF GERMANY HAVE IN WORLD

A few days ago one of the socialist deputies told the Imperial German government that "the clock stood at five minutes to twelve." The clock has struck. The president of the United States has sent forth a ringing call to all friends of freedom to help in liberating the enslaved subjects of the Hohenzollern dynasty. The desire is not to rally a mighty arm for the purpose of killing more Germans, but to free them. "We have no quarrel with the German people," said the president, "we have no feeling toward them but one of sympathy and friendship."

But when those subjects against their will are hurried from one battle front to another, and are ordered to "do or die" without questioning the motives of their autocratic rulers, or without having the slightest assurance or more freedom, even should they save their fatherland; and when their wives and children are compelled to literally starve in order that the name of the Kaiser and his system might survive, then it becomes the duty of the liberty loving people of the world over, to join in overthrowing such a tyrannical regime. There is no neutral ground. The issue is thrust upon us—we cannot escape it; it is individual liberty to the world or its enslavement to a heartless, soulless autocracy. It means the rule of reason or that of force. Let no one be deceived. He who is not actively engaged in some way, for liberty, is an enemy to it. He that is not for me is against me. He that gathereth not with me scattereth abroad! There is no middle ground. It is either with the president or for the Kaiser. It behoves all classes—the pacifist, the militarist, German sympathizers and all—to join the hosts of crusaders, in this war for democracy and self-government; which we believe will hasten the coming of peace on earth and good will to men, God's message to the world.

One of the most sublime truths contained in President Wilson's masterful

address is the statement in which he announced, "we are at the beginning of an age in which it will be insisted that the same standards of conduct and of responsibility for wrong done, should be observed among nations and their governments, that are observed among the individual citizens of civilized states." The meaning of the golden rule, first enunciated by the greatest friend man ever had, seems now about to be realized. The recent awakening of Russia adds one hundred and sixty millions more people to the countless throngs that are to share in this blessed privilege. And oh! the pity of it, if the teston is denied or denies himself this same inalienable right—the truth that shall make them free!

And now that our president has sounded the call, not for the destruction of the German people, but for their liberation, we plead with all the lovers of democracy, American, English, French, Bulgarian, German, Roumanian, Slav, Latin and all—to join in carrying this gospel of freedom into the very trenches themselves, and let it find lodgment there, where the soil is ripe and hungry for the seed of liberty.

A kind-hearted patient and courageous leader—even for the German—has been found in our president. Let us hold up his hands in this his supreme effort to serve all humanity, now and hereafter. Time has proven to the people of the south that "Abraham Lincoln was their best friend." The time will come when the Teutonic race will see, that in all the world they have no better friend than Woodrow Wilson.
