

## 3,000 PUPILS TAKE PART IN GYM FESTIVAL

Three thousand children will take part in the Gymnastic Festival Friday afternoon at Reid Field. This is the third annual festival. Children from the third grade through the High school will participate.

Seats are being arranged for 5,000 persons, with parking space for automobiles. The opening number will start at 2:30 o'clock. Richmond Concert band will furnish the music.
