

ROOT DISPELLS OPPOSITION OF RUSS SOCIALISTS

American Envoy and Party
Cordially Welcomed by
Extreme Wing of Republic.

MOSCOW, (Friday), June 22.—The first meeting attended here by Ellhu Root and the other members of the American commission was held today in the palace of the Governor General. There were assembled representatives of the zemstvo and municipal unions, the zemstvo industrial committee and the local council of the workmen's and soldiers' deputies.

The meeting was in the nature of a test to determine whether the commission was to have the real sympathy of the Socialist element in the country. It was said here that no foreigner ever before succeeded in enlisting the attention and interest in this association of committees representing the working masses of Moscow. But as Mr. Root began to speak antagonism and indifference yielded to rapt attention and he was warmly applauded at the conclusion.

"Marvel at Self-Control." "We have seen nothing since we came to Russia," said Mr. Root, "that gives cause for criticism. We marvel at the self-control, the kindness of spirit and the sound common sense that the Russians display. We feel that the work you are doing in the committees is on the right path toward an actual permanent democracy."

"The government of Germany, the German social system, even German socialism, are all militaristic in their essential nature. They shall not gain control of free America, and if we can help you to prevent their gaining control of free Russia we shall be happy in feeling that we have assisted in the perpetuation of the ideals of our fathers, who fought and sacrificed to make us free."

Formal Welcome Given. The representatives of the various groups replied, formally welcoming Mr. Root and the other members of the commission.

The entire assembly arose and cheered the Americans when they left the hall.

On motion of the mayor the meeting unanimously decided to send a telegram to President Wilson thanking him for sending the Root commission to Russia.

Finly Has \$10,000
Connorsville Republicans have looked up the tax duplicates and have discovered that "Practically Penniless" Gray is assessed for more than \$10,000 of real estate, Elliott's assessment being about one-tenth that amount.

In three normally Democratic counties, Shelby, Hancock and Franklin, the outlook is far from encouraging to the Gray leaders. In Hancock county several of the most influential Democratic leaders are out in the open for Gray's scalp, and this situation exists, to a less degree, in Shelby county.

In Franklin the activity of "Brother George" Gray in the conduct of Finly Gray's campaign has hurt the Democratic nominees greatly.

The former judge is "in bad" with many Franklin Democrats, and when the word was passed around that if Finly Gray was elected, "Brother George" would receive an appointment with a fat salary attached to it several Democratic workers in and around Brookville jumped the party reservation and went on the warpath against the Gray brothers.

In Union county and in Rush county predictions were made today that Elliott would carry each county by substantial majorities.

Elliott has made a thorough canvass of the district despite the short duration of the campaign and has made a splendid impression everywhere.

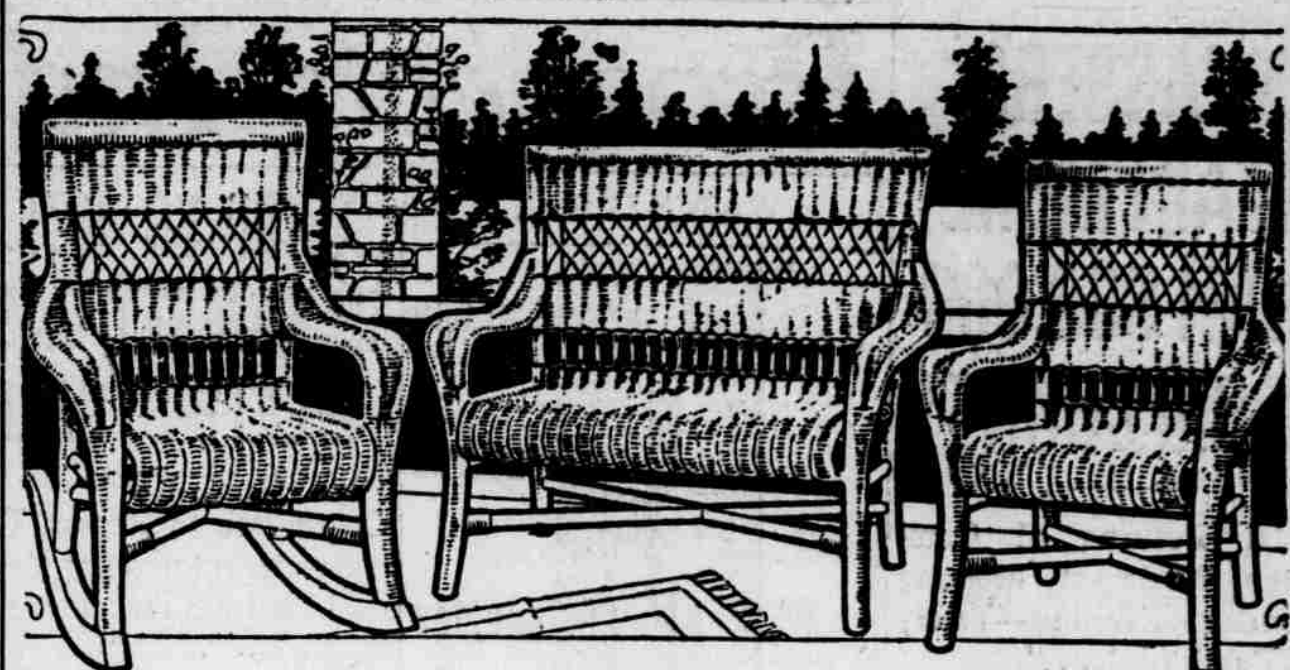

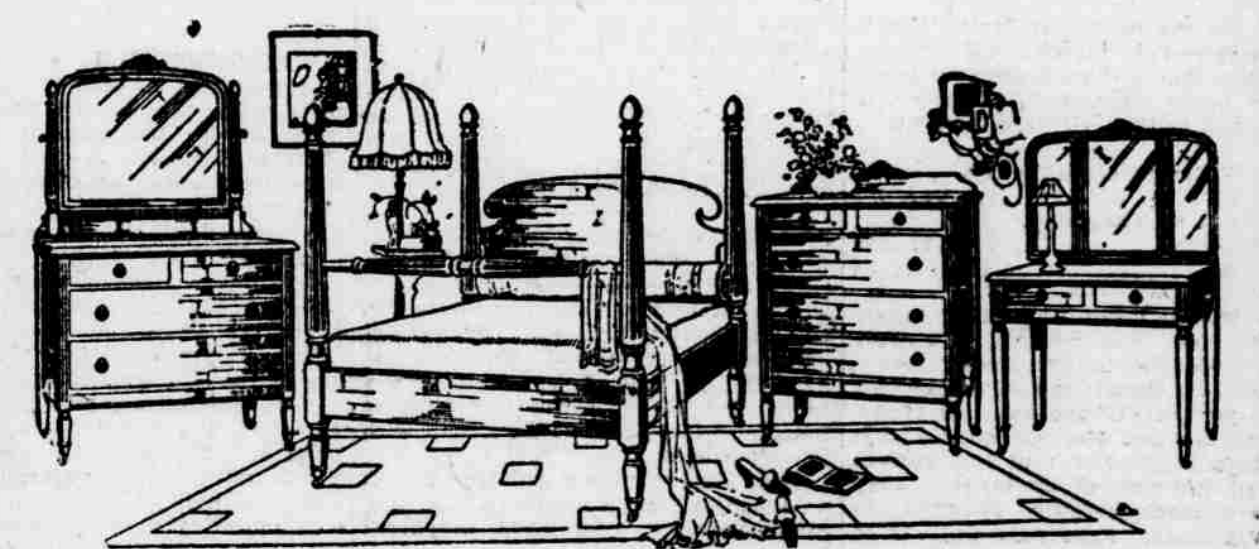
