**EVANSVILLE, Ind., July 5.**—Continuing their activities with the stick, Rufe Gilbert's Quakers hammered the offerings of Shoup and Townsend all over the lot in the first game of the double header here Wednesday afternoon and won, 7 to 2. They lost their hitting eye before the slants of Adams in the second contest, however, and were forced to take the zero end of a 5 to 0 score.

The Quakers showed all kinds of hitting ability in the first contest and with Gygil leading the swatters with three safeties in four chances, they touched Shoup for nine hits and three runs in the first seven innings. Townsend relieved Shoup in the box for the Evas in the eighth and went good for one round. In the ninth, however, the Quakers again started on a hitting party and five safeties brought four more runs and sewed up the contest. Gilbert's men were unable to connect with the offerings of Adams in the second game, and with three blows, one of which was a scratch, the Quakers were unable to cross the pan. Nine hits were gathered by the Evas from Gilbert's slants, including a home run by Hauger and a double by Kibbie, scoring five runs and pulling home an easy victory.

**NEW FORM OF ECONOMY**  
BERNE, Switzerland, July 5.—The Bundesrat—the Federal Council of Germany—issued an ordinance on June 2 which forbids slaughtering of animals by the old fashioned way of throat cutting except by duly qualified Jewish butchers, according to advice received here from Berlin. The object is to save all blood for human consumption in the form of food products.
