

## STATE COUNCIL SPEAKERS TO BE HERE SEPT. 25

Meetings to Be Held All Over  
State in War-Aim Cam-  
paign.

The Indiana State Council of Defense in speeding up the work in this state is planning a booster trip to cover the entire state in four days, beginning September 25. The state will be divided into groups of four counties and there will be twenty-three teams of two men each for this work. These men will have met in Indianapolis and have become thoroughly familiarized with the purposes of the national council and the war department in this work, and accomplished by federal agents, will go into the respective counties.

At these meetings they will explain in detail the purpose of the government and the plan of the future organization of the county councils. These men will be in Richmond Tuesday, September 25th, and a meeting of all members of the local council together with the judge of the circuit court and all members of sub-committees has been called for that day at 2 p. m. in the Circuit Court Room.

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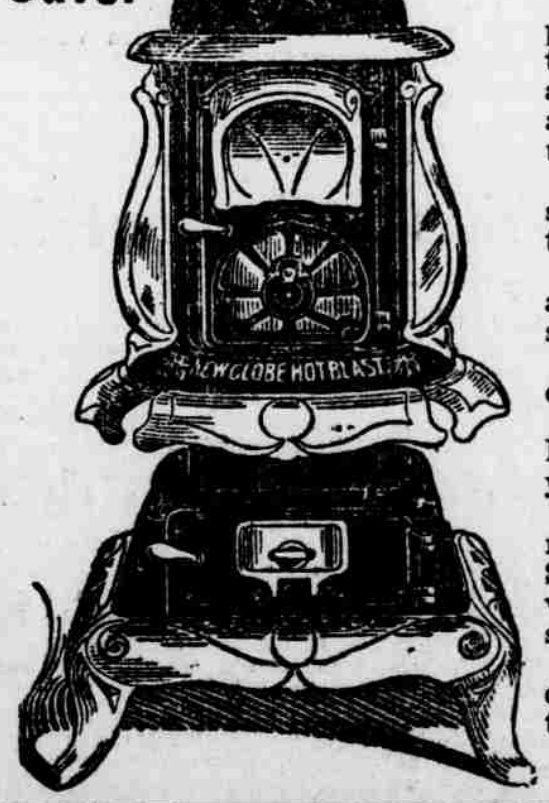
