Total Expected to Reach \$250
When Drive Closes Saturday.

RICHMOND GETS ANOTHER BANNER

Another banner came to Richmond when the Globe Fertilizer Co. of St. Louis stated that Jones and Williams of this city had sold more fertilizer retail than any other firm in the United States this fall season. There were 62 cars, or 1,000 tons sold in Wayne county of the value of about \$20,000, to the farmers of Wayne county. These figures estimate that the wheat sown is of larger acreage, for last season 47 cars only were sold.

Farmers did not know of "Bloody Butcher Corn," until Walter Test of the south section secured the seed from a relative in Northern Indiana, and planted it on his farm this year. Two specimen stalks exhibited yesterday are 14 feet high, and contain ears that are full and even, the prediction being made that the corn will go 60 bushels to the acre.

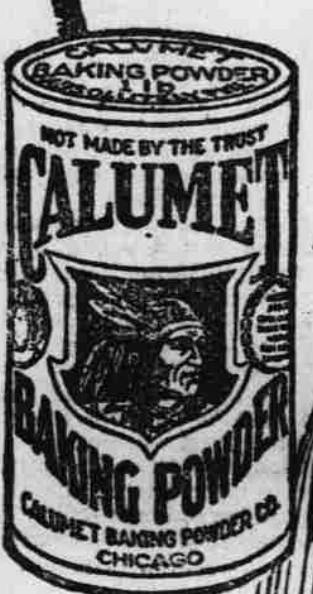

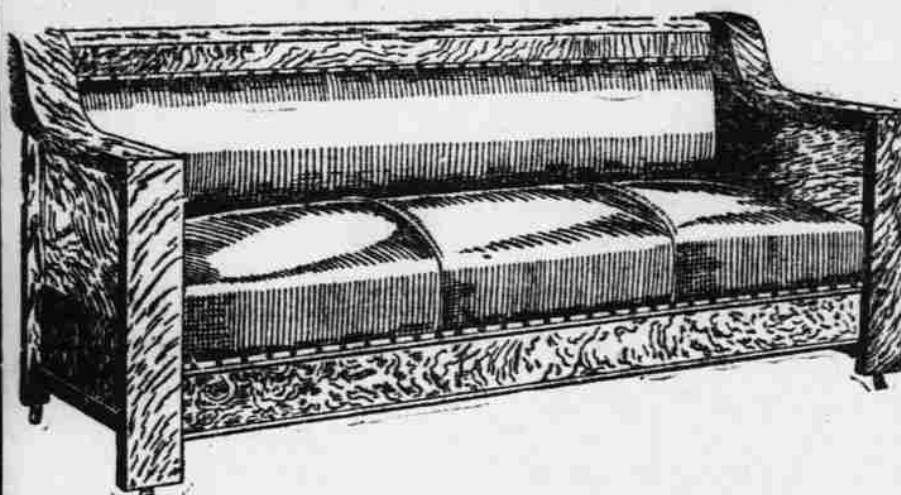
