

## S. SOLDIERS REET BIG GUNS S OLD COMRADES

American Soldiers in France  
Are Delighted With Mon-  
ster French Weapons.

AMERICAN TRAINING CAMP IN  
FRANCE, Wednesday, Oct. 10.—(By  
the Associated Press.)—Not far be-  
hind the American field artillery,  
which has been in training in a rug-  
ged section of France for the past two  
months, have come the men of the  
heavies." They are veteran gunners  
and many are familiar with the big  
guns at home and they greeted almost  
as comrades the monster French weap-  
ons which they are now groming for  
eventual use against the Germans.

Some of the guns with which the  
American artillerymen are training  
are wonderful and ponderous ex-  
amples of the French gunners' skill  
and daring. They are from the 155,  
marvelously effective up to the stag-  
gering 400 that hurl huge explosive  
hell weighing short of a ton. The  
60's are more potent than the Big  
Berthas ever were in their days of  
great destruction.

In calibre the guns range from the  
short squat mortars which sit upon  
their haunches like giant frogs, up  
through the various members of the  
Howitzer family to the truly sinister  
rifle, rifles with their long tapering  
barrels.

Delighted With Weapons.

The Americans are delighted with  
their French weapons and are busy  
studying every detail and adapting  
themselves to the use of French ma-  
terial. Most of the heavy gunners are  
men of long experience and do not  
need much actual firing practice be-  
fore taking their place in line against  
the enemy. They have been a little  
surprised to find that with the big  
land guns used here speed is not a  
great factor. These heavy weapons  
are used when dealing with concrete  
dugouts and other enemy defenses  
that cannot run away. Accuracy is  
the great goal of all heavy gunners.

Asked if his men would not find it  
difficult to shoot without direct ob-  
servation, the general commanding the  
heavy artillery contingent replied:

"We will have direct observation  
here. The only difference will be that  
the observer, instead of standing be-  
side the gun, will be sitting aloft in  
an airplane. You can depend upon it  
that each shot we fire at the enemy  
will be watched and recorded."

The wireless branch of the heavy  
artillery service is one of great im-  
portance. At schools already estab-  
lished radio pupils are being specially  
trained in communication with air-  
planes and observation balloons.

Officers Complete Study.

Scores of reserve officers from  
Plattsburg and other training camps  
are completing their technical education  
in the artillery schools here. The  
officers, individually, selected for the  
artillery service because of their education  
in higher mathematics and engineering,  
are proving a great joy to their commander and instructors. It  
is predicted that all will make splendid  
officers in active service.

The American gunners have been  
much interested in the big 240's which  
are hauled by caterpillar tractors, but  
the real pets with the gunners from  
overseas are those aristocrats among  
the heavies which command special  
railroad cars. Some of these rulers of  
the cannon world are so important and  
so valuable that an entire artillery  
train is devoted to them. These trains  
are a strange looking affair in their  
fantastic war paint, resembling at a  
distance a mammoth rattlesnake. Even  
the engines are included in the camou-  
flage and may resemble anything from  
a brick house to a giant hedgehog.

The French sense of humor cannot  
be suppressed by three years of war.  
French officers have named one of the  
largest guns turned over to the Ameri-  
can forces "Le Rire."

EATON, O., Oct. 12.—Coal shortage  
in this city has reached such an alarming  
state that members of council have  
been stirred to action, and an  
order for six carloads has been sent to  
Attorney General McGhee by Mayor  
Foss. According to advice from  
Columbus, the order will be filled.  
Council plans to place the consignment  
in the hands of local retailers  
for distribution. Sales, however, will  
be limited to not more than one ton  
to a customer.
