Arrows show how Austro-Germans hope to drive through Italy.

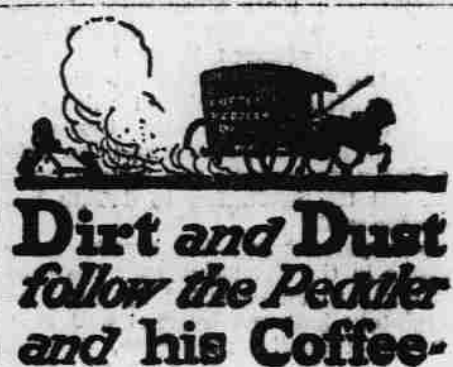

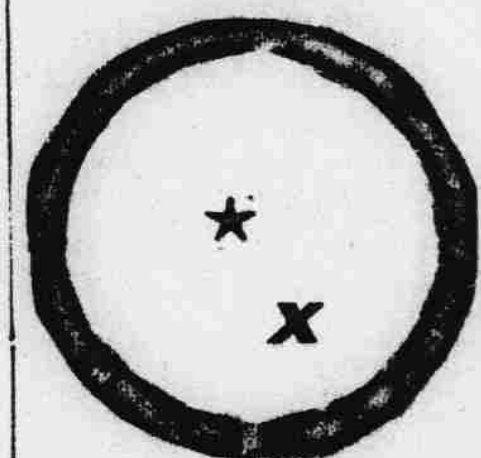
HAGERSTOWN, IND.

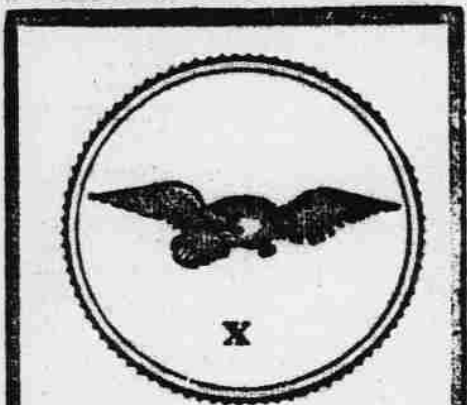
