

CONDUCTOR OF ORCHESTRA HIT IN BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, Nov. 7.—Former Gov. Warfield denounced Dr. Karl Muck to a big assemblage at a patriotic meeting at the Lyric theater this afternoon. It was in this hall that the Boston Symphony orchestra concert was to be held tomorrow night.

In the course of his address Gov. Warfield read a letter from Cardinal Gibbons, in which he said:

"I regret that I cannot attend the meeting arranged in honor of the 'Star Spangled Banner,' but shall be with you in spirit and approve with all my heart of the efforts being put forth to surround the sacred emblem of our country with all the respect which it should command."

"As with the ark of the old covenant, he who touches it with profane hands shall suffer."

Hoped Key Haunts Director.

Capt. Hughes, representing Gen. Kuhn and Gen. Nicholson at Camp Meade, said he was there to voice the protests of his generals of the army here and the army over there. He concluded: "Muck's reference to the 'Star Spangled Banner' was sufficient to make Francis Scott Key turn over in his grave, and I hope that Key will arise in his grave and haunt Muck."

Deafening applause greeted the remarks.

Resolutions were adopted denouncing Dr. Muck for having refused to play the national anthem.

"We consider he has publicly insulted every patriotic citizen, and especially every citizen of Maryland, the state in which the national anthem had its birth," they say.

Encore for Dr. Muck.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—After he had led the Boston Symphony orchestra in the "Star Spangled Banner," Dr. Muck, the German director, was encored this afternoon by an audience that filled every available space in the National theater.

The encore was given at the close of the program, the audience refusing to leave until Dr. Muck returned to the stage and bowed. Such an encore at dignified orchestra concerts is said never to have occurred in Washington. Secretary of the Interior Lane and party occupied the White House box.

served in council before. Williams has been a member of council for the last twelve years, serving longer than any other man ever has served.

In the Sixth ward, E. H. Stegman, the Republican candidate, was elected to council by a plurality of eight votes over M. W. Pennell, the Citizens candidate. Stegman won 272 votes and Pennell 264.

Councilmen Run Close.

In the First ward Joseph W. Stegman, Democrat, was elected to council, receiving 264 votes. J. P. Reid, Republican, received 228; G. J. Retz, Socialist, 34 votes, and M. J. Quigley, Citizens, 104.

John P. White was elected to council in the Second ward getting 218 votes; J. W. Bolser, Democrat, received 88; T. J. Webb, Citizens, 56; and F. D. Lane, 18.

D. B. Golden, Republican, received 259 votes in the Third ward; H. S. Stillinger, Citizens, 119; William Urban, 75; and Zephaniah Thomas, Socialist, 18.

In the Fourth ward, B. L. Bull was elected to council by a vote of 301; H. H. Schuermann, Democrat, was his nearest opponent, receiving 248; W. F. Klop, Citizens candidate received 228 and Smith Ross, Socialist, 32.

In the Fifth ward, J. J. Ford, Republican, received 365 votes; J. G. Porter, the Citizens candidate, 361; O. C. Woods, Democrat, 171; and L. F. Cross, 57.

E. H. Stegman, Republican, was elected in the Sixth ward, polling 272 votes. M. W. Pennell, the Citizens candidate received 264 and H. F. Hasekoster, Socialist, 17.

In the Seventh ward, W. P. Richardson received 268 votes and J. W. Outland, Citizens candidate, 264. Edward Woillard, Socialist received 15.

H. A. Schweizer, was elected in the Eighth ward, getting 112 votes. W. E. Wilkins, Democrat, received 103; J. M. Lantz, Citizens, 49 and M. F. Gross, Socialist 10.

Results in Indiana

DEMOS CARRY EVANSVILLE
EVANSVILLE, Ind., Nov. 7.—Benjamin Bosse, Democrat, was re-elected mayor of Evansville by a plurality of 3,154 and a majority of 640 over Albert Messick, the Republican candidate. The vote was Bosse 7,602; Messick 4,448, and LaMonte, Socialist, 2,514.

Bosse carried every precinct in the city with the exception of one and that was carried by LaMonte. The entire democratic ticket was elected.

BUNCH WINS AT MUNCIE
MUNCIE, Ind., Nov. 7.—Major John J. Bunch, Democrat, was re-elected mayor with an unofficial plurality of 2,004 over Charles O. Grafton, Republican. The largest poll in the history of the city was cast.

DEMOCRATS WIN ALL.
BROOKVILLE, Ind., Nov. 7.—Simeon Colebank and Burt Moran were elected councilmen and Frank West was chosen as treasurer-clerk. All are Democrats.

TWENTY-SEVEN VOTES CAST
NASHVILLE, Ind., Nov. 7.—Twenty-seven votes were cast here Tuesday. The Democrats elected Jackson Woods as trustee and George A. Allison as clerk and A. F. Moore, treasurer.

CUTSHALL IS ELECTED
FORT WAYNE, Nov. 7.—W. S. Cutshall, Republican, was elected mayor of Fort Wayne by an overwhelming majority over Maurice Nieser, the Democratic candidate. The Socialists polled nearly 3,000 votes.

G. O. P. CARRIES COLUMBUS
COLUMBUS, Nov. 7.—The Republicans elected the entire ticket with the exception of Martin Mueller, Democrat, who was re-elected city treasurer by eight votes. Frank S. Jones was elected mayor by a plurality of 400 over Mayor H. K. Volland, Democrat James H. Arnold, the Socialist candidate for mayor, received 209 votes.

REPUBLICAN VICTORY
LEBANON, Ind., Nov. 7.—The Democratic administration was ousted when Lebanon voters elected the entire Republican ticket, including all councilmen. P. O. Lauer was elected mayor by a vote of 751, with F. O. Myers, the Democratic candidate second, with a vote of 565.

G. O. P. CARRIES ALL
ANGOLA, Ind., Nov. 7.—Marion Hetzler, Republican, was elected mayor over Spencer P. J. Creel, who voted a vote of 256 to 160. A Republican councilman was also chosen.

DEMOS WIN AT PERU
PERU, Ind., Nov. 7.—Maurice Clifford, Democrat, was elected mayor with seven candidates elected to council. Two candidates on the Citizens' ticket were elected to council.

DUMONT KENNEDY ELECTED
CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., Nov. 7.—Republicans carried every office here electing Dumont Kennedy for mayor by a plurality of 485 votes over Jesse W. Canfield, Democrat.

G. O. P. CARRIES WIN
SHOALS, Ind., Nov. 7.—The entire Republican ticket was elected here with Alonzo Brown as trustee; J. H. Hawkins, clerk and W. B. Clifton, treasurer.

VEVAY DEMOCRATIC
VEVAY, Ind., Nov. 7.—The entire Democratic ticket, with the exception of one councilman, was elected here, by majorities ranging from one vote to sixteen votes.

G. O. P. WINS BY DEFAULT
ROCKPORT, Ind., Nov. 7.—The Republican ticket here was the only one voted on Tuesday, because of the failure of the Democratic candidates to file their certificates of nomination.


